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3. Check the amount you wish transferred each month from your checking account to your Christmas Club account. (Choice of six even amounts: \$2.50, \$5.00, \$10.00, \$15.00, \$25.00, or \$50.00 per month.) Sign and hand the card to any teller or bank officer.
4. As your checking account statement is returned to you each month, you receive a reminder that the amount you specified has been transferred to Christmas Club savings. This will remind you to make the deduction on your check records.
5. These transfers continue automatically for ten months, from January through October. The same authorization is continued from year to year, unless you wish to cancel it.
6. That's all you do! You need not stop in at the bank with your Christmas Club receipt book, or remember from week to week to make your deposit. You simply relax, and next November you will receive a check for the full amount in your Christmas Club account, *plus interest*.

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
