Varieties available vary including Austrian Pine, Ponderosa Pine, Chinese Arborvitae, Chinese Elm, Locust, Green Ash, Caragana and others. Special trees for particular sites or appearance can many times be secured from out of state.

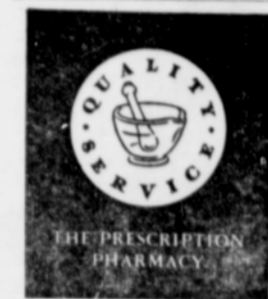
