STATE TAXES

We doubt if any of the bills so far introduced in the Oregon legislature to change the tax picture will pass and must say that no harm will be done if none do. Some small changes may be worked out later.

Right now the legislators are having fun with Governor Hatfield's budget which is standard procedure. Republicans, stimulated to be sure by that astute business man, Howard Belmont, have said they would like to pay some extra cash on hand. Good sense, too, and a little too good to be enacted.

Democrats have another tack. Some of them would cut income taxes by ten percent which is a nice gimmick but practically of no value unless the legislature reduces spending by that much. That we approve. Just cutting the taxes is a futile gesture that serves only to postpone payment unless accompanied by less spending.

Then another group has an idea that taxpayers should offset ten percent of their income taxes by deducting property tax payment up to that amount. It was not long ago that Oregon had an offset provision. As a practical way of handling a tax problem we doubt its usefulness although it will have an appeal to land owners.

Welfare has survived the conditions it was resigned to cure. As a plan for governmental generosity during a time of depression a welfare program was a social necessity. That it has lasted through a time of prosperity is indication of the strength of bureaucracy and the utter worthlessness of the incompetent and weak. People will fail as long as failure is made easy. Welfare is a constant drag on the economy and tax resources of the state which is bad enough; it is also a drag on the spirits of those who will not care for themselves unless the alternative is starvation. There is a simple way to cure them.

It is indicative of our habit of thinking about government that increased incomes should result in bigger government. When incomes are down we also increase government. Unless this changes we will soon have a complete bureaucracy and everyone will be hungry.

SPRING

First across the flat in the grass and sage came the dogs, young dogs with a curiosity about every mound of earth not inspected since last fall. They bounced up and down as they ran, their ears flopping in the brisk west wind.

Then came the small children, running against the wind, following the dogs and equally inquisitive, dressed in warm coats and only half needing them that warm, windy afternoon.

Larger children followed, mostly girls and at an inquisitive age with plans for keeping house. Water had to be carried from the muddy creek in discarded tin cans, some had to sit just so as the elder gave instruction in some instantaneously made up game.

It all meant nothing, the quick survey of an open field by dogs and children, the rushing about in the fresh spring air. There was no plan, merely a desire to be outside on the first day it was possible with comfort. Children are as good harbingers of spring as violets or daffodils for they are close to nature and the restrictions of what we call civilization have not been forced upon them.

JUDGE'S PAY

There are bills in the legislature to increase the pay of nearly everyone on the state's payroll. That is common practice for some one always wants more pay and some one wants his good will so is willing to introduce a bill for his increased salary. So far most of the increases have been far too large.

There is, however, one group of public servants who have earned a pay increase. That is the judges. It was only a few years ago that the state was concerned over the state of the judicial docket for the courts were far behind with their cases and lawyers were filing appeals because they could get three or four years delay by merely filing. Justice was being delayed.

Then we arranged for some temporary supreme court help, put the circuit judges on a faster schedule until today the courts are almost abreast with the cases on hand.

The improvement has been marked and has taken a comparatively short time. The courts have done a good job and are entitled to more pay.

BILLS BILLS BILLS

Reading bills and lists of bills introduced into the legislature is a discouraging practice. Oregon is probably little different from other states for the tendency appears general.

In this state nearly every one of the 90 legislators has a bill or two that will give government a little stronger hold on the daily lives of the citizens who elected them to office. Then there are the vast number of bills introduced at the request of the state boards and all of them for the purpose of strengthening bureaucracy.

New legislators are soon indoctrinated into the order of big government advocates. It may not be entirely their fault for around Salem there are many who speak for government and a very few (and these are lobbyists) who speak for the people. A citizen might do better under a dictator for no dictator could possibly have as expansive an imagination as ninety legislators. Either the people who want less government—and we are sure they are in the majority—must watch legislation much more closely or hire some one to do it for them. A selection of candidates who had voted for more restrictions would help if citizens were informed.

But probably nothing will be done, that is until the governmental bureaucracy falls from its own weight and the malnutrition that must come to big government because as it handicaps the people and renders them subservient it reduces its own potential income.

We do not think Oregon's income tax is perfect but we do not think the elimination of the federal tax as a deduction will improve it.
