EXPLANATION

The Board of Directors of the North Sherman TV Co-op wishes to inform its constituents of the financial status of the Company to date.

In an effort to furnish television to the area, our maintenance costs have been necessarily increased. This increase in costs is reflected by the net loss figure of \$370.90, which has occurred from 5-1-60 to 12-31-60, and \$1,668.46 since inception.

We have definite plans to improve the TV reception by installation of improved transmitting antennae, however, unless more people support our program by subscription or purchase of stock this company cannot continue to supply a service to the community.

There are 131 constituents receiving our services, who are currently supporting the program by monthly service charge payments.

To the communities receiving the TV signal from our translator and re-distributing through cable systems, we wish to extend our thanks to Arlington and Grass Valley for their financial support.

This co-operative is controlled by 141 members who own the Capital Stock, at the rate of \$100.00 per share. Capital Stock is still available to the public at the above figure.

All individual receivers are requested to pay \$3.00 per mo. to cover costs of maintenance and repair. In addition, all subscribers receiving these services through cable systems are requested to contribute \$1.50 per channel per member per year.

It is estimated that well over 1,000 sets are receiving the signal from our installation. It seems that modern entertainment has been provided to many homes with only 10% of the users carrying their fair share of maintenance costs.
