1. Is the physical integrity of the fiber important in high concentrate diets?
2. Is the incorporation of alfalfa pellets in such a diet beneficial and at what periods?
3. At what time should animals on such a dietary regime be implanted with diethylstilbestrol?
4. Will calves handle this type of diet as well as older cattle?

Other cattle feeding experiments at this location include: (1) record of performance testing of 48 Hereford and Angus calves, (2) enaymatic studies and 2 fistulated Hereford steers, (3) 12 Hereford cows fed no iodized salt to study the nutritional effect upon offspring of parents carrying hydrocephalic genes and (4) feeding management studies on 75 grade female.

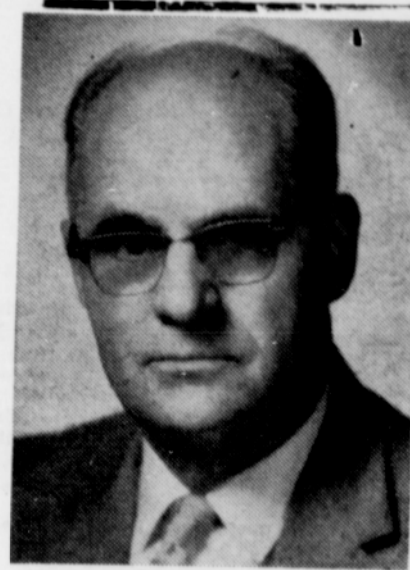
Each girl was given a piece of the smaller ones and three length for the bigger ones.
