**TAXATION WITHOUT REPRESENTATION**

The reapportionment bill passed by the House Monday is not much of a bill for the purpose but may be the best possible under the constitutional provision which was written by and for people who understood mathematics but knew nothing of geography or economics or sociology.

Under the bill now undergoing senatorial scrutiny five counties in the mid-Columbia basin will be subjected to taxation without representation and we intend to notify everyone that taxation without representation is as distasteful to us as it was to our forbears who fought England to abolish it.

Neither are we going to accept any such contention as the fact that we can vote for senators and representatives. We could not possibly elect England might have attached each of the American colonies to some London district back in 1776 and evaded the charge as easily.

The area in question will very likely be the fastest growing part of Oregon in the next ten years. It will have growing pains and problems galore. Yet, its only representation will come from county that was is and will be opposed to the development of these counties.

Representation in at least one house should be on the basis of geography and no government can be called representative unless there is a voice provided for each established district—and each county is a separate entity by state law. The job of the legislature is to settle problems and the problems of these five counties will not even be heard there.

Therefore these counties and the other disfranchised counties of Oregon should—and we hope, will—find other means of getting their needs cared for.

**IF TRUE, IT'S BAD**

Lyle Wilson, who writes a column from Washington for United Press, said recently that the Republicans were in trouble because the Democrats had grabbed onto all the popular giveaways and were gaining in membership steadily and that even the coalition of conservative southern Democrats and Republicans would not long be able to stop the Democrats from their program.

He may be right and we suspicion he is. The party that promises most and gives most will remain the most popular. But he is wrong about who is in trouble. It isn't only the Republicans; it is the whole country.

The United States is a big country; it was a prosperous country that had great resources of land and minerals and timber. One well known member of the "liberal" group said the country was so rich it would be impossible to give enough away to hurt it. He did not reckon with the ability of the politicians to distribute the national wealth.

What happens to a political party is but temporary and usually includes nothing more drastic than changing a name. Republicans have been Federalists and Whigs. Democrats have kept the name but have changed their philosophy. The men who now parade under that name would not have been allowed on the same street with the sturdy and self-reliant men who formed the party.

Unless each American becomes responsible for his own welfare, his own job, his own retirement, his own family to the very best of his ability the whole country is in trouble. Not only is Lincoln's statement true that "government should not do for the people what the people can do for themselves" but it is also true that government cannot do for the people what they will not do for themselves.

Someway we seem to be interested in the wrong things. Papers are full of murder and rockets and magazines tell of mechanical marvels. What we mean is that if our interest were in more earthly, more human things we might be more normal.
