VICTORY OF POPULISM

One day this week while delving
into the insides of the old
Parry house we discovered some
pages on the People's Party Pa-
per printed in Atlanta, Ga., prob-
ably under the eye of Tom Watson,

leader of the Populists as the
members of the People's party
were called.
It was not surprising to discover
this memory of the political
past for the house was built by
W. J. and Frank Peddicord as a
residence for W. J. who taught
school in Moro and was a candi-
date for school superintendent in

1892 being defeated by Hiram
Tyree, and who made it in 1896.
After a term he became editor of
the local populist newspaper and
wrote long screeds about the
necessity of adopting the theo-
ries of that group.
Sorrow not for the populists.
Nothing is dead about that party
but the name. As the New Deal
and whatever new Truman called
his administration and the New
Frontier, populism goes on strong-
er than it was when William J.
Bryan ran as a Democrat advocat-
ing free coinage of silver at 16 to 1.

Populists hate money (other
people's money) and hate busi-
ness and always have some gim-
mick to make money easy for
all without going through the
trouble of earning it. Modern
populists call themselves liberals
which they are not for liberals
traditionally hate government.

Back in 1893 when the paper
that started this editorial was
printed, populists were advocat-
ing the free coinage of silver and
a graduated income tax, postal
savings banks, government man-
agement of railroads, telephone
and telegraph, an eight hour day
on government work, the initia-
tive and referendum, and a single
term for president. You see the
Populists have done right well.

But the suspicion that is the
ear mark of all Populists still
prevails. If anyone has money or
displays the evidence of it he is
a target for Populists who are
very sure he could not have gotten
it without some form of dis-
honesty. They are often poor in
money and often poor in more
important things.

CIVIL WAR CENTENNIAL

The Oregon Historical Society
is sponsoring a tour of old camp
sites and forts in this part of the
state next week starting at The
Dalles where there was a fort in
early days, one building of which
still stands. Fort The Dalles was
established shortly after the Cay-
uses killed Marcus Whitman and
was used as a starting place for
activities against the aroused
Indians.

Other forts and camps are more
closely related to the Civil War
for that conflict took federal
soldiers away from the frontier
and the west had the job of de-
fending itself against Indians. It
didn't do a very good job of it
either, for Indians became more
unruly in the early part of the
1860s. The white men were break-
ing into their territory at a fast-
rate, too, because they wanted
to dig for gold until it got so a
home loving Indian could hardly
chase a deer without running
across the tracks of some pesky
white.

Both colors were afraid of
each other and therefore hated
each other which made for several
battles which Indians often won
for they traveled more quietly
than did the whites, made a nar-
rower trail and were better ac-
quainted with the country.

The tour next week will in-
clude Camp Watson in Wheeler
County east and south of Mitchell
the outfitting of which was one
of the reasons for building roads
that became The Dalles Military
road after the need for it had
disappeared. Camp Maury, Camp
Dahlgren and Camp Polk, will
also be on the route of the his-
torians.

Anyone who would like to
spend a weekend driving through
eastern Oregon sunshine over
sometime historic roads to re-
view some of the evidence of the
effort made a hundred years ago

to make this country safe for set-
tlers can join the tour at The
Dalles Friday night, April 28. Cer-
tainly there is nothing to streng-
then the spirit of this generation,
quite so potent as study of the
oft times vallant deeds of the
pioneers.

JOHN BIRCH SOCIETY

We are not concerned over the
fete of the John Birch society
whose self appointed leaders seem
unrealistically reactionary in po-
litical ideas. Some are as socially
violent as the communists they
would like to defeat. Some preach
an austerity not likely to be fa-
vored by enough of the pampered
to make the reform effort prac-
tical and thus are wasting time.

But we are very much con-
cerned about the reasons why the
John Birch society is attracting
so much attention. Recall of Earl
Warren would not appall us al-
though reinstatement of the laws
held unconstitutional by the
Warren court would be no great
handicap to the Communists.

What we suspicion gives the
John Birch society support is the
fear and dislike of big govern-
ment and big taxes and the ap-
parent prospect of getting more
of the same for the next four
years. Communism is big govern-
ment and total control of pro-
duction. In other words the John
Birchers seem to be trying to be
individuals in a socialistic society
and being rather unsuccessful at
it.

There isn't much need of any
new agencies to fight communism
whose name is anathema al-
though its philosophy is gain-
ing. Some who profess the most
fear of communism embrace its
ideas so that what we need
more than another group to fight
communism is some better under-
standing of what communism is.
This does not seem to be the role
of the John Birch group.

But there must be an under-
current of individualism and a
hidden dislike for big govern-
ment to have made this little
group so prominent.

On this 5th day of April, 1961,
the above entitled Court being in
regular session for the transac-
tion of county business, said day
being the first day of the regular
April Term and the matter of
building, improving and maintain-
ing the permanent roads of said
county being under considera-
tion; and

It appearing to the Court that
the annual tax levy within the
constitutional limitation is insuf-
ficient to furnish the necessary
funds to build, improve and
maintain the roads of the county
on a permanent, sound and
lasting basis and that the general
condition of the roads is becom-
ing worse each year because of
this lack of funds; and

It further appearing to the
Court that a program should be
started immediately and be con-
tinued for a period of five years to
reconstruct and oil surface of the
most heavily traveled county
roads from farm to market; and
It further appearing to the
Court that in order to carry out
such a program ad valorem taxes;

should be levied serially outside
of the limitation imposed by sec-
tion 11, Article XI, Oregon Con-
stitution, in the amount of \$50-
000.00 each year for a period of
five years commencing with the
tax year 1961-1962 and ending
with the tax year 1965-1966, the
total levies and outlay for said
purpose to be the sum of \$250-
000.00; and

It further appearing to the
Court that the matter of makin-
g such tax levies should be submit-
ted to the legal and qualified
voters of Sherman County at a
special election.
It is hereby ORDERED that a
Special Election be held in Sher-
man County, Oregon, on Friday,
the 12th day of May, 1961, be-
tween the hours of 8:00 o'clock
A. M. and 8:00 o'clock P. M. at
the regular and usual polling
places, at which special election

electors of Sherman County, Ore-
gon, the question of whether ad
valorem taxes shall be levied out-

\$50,000.00 each year for a period

ing with the tax year 1965-1966,
for total tax levies of \$250,000.00
