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Harbor Expansion Program Approved for Portland!

Recent passage of a 9½ million dollar bond issue in Portland assures continued development of the Portland Public Docks.

This increases to 22½ million dollars the total investment Portland is making in its terminal and cargo handling facilities.

Some of these funds have been used for construction of a giant new bulk unloader which will cut importing costs of ores, ore concentrates and other dry bulk cargoes.

Portland, rallied by its leadership of all Pacific Coast ports in the movement of dry cargo tonnage for the past four years, is moving to further increase cargoes and reduce shipping costs by providing the most modern, time-saving facilities and cargo handling methods.
