WE GO VISITING

This week we took an opportunity to go traipsing off to southern Oregon and learn some history by visiting Jacksonville where gold was discovered in 1851 to start the first Oregon excitement about the precious metal; and where citizens have started a museum to commemorate the events of the past hundred years.

Jacksonville swelled to be the largest town in Oregon having about a tenth of the state's 30,000 persons at the height of the gold fever. It was the county seat of Jackson county until 1927 when Medford took that honor away leaving an old, but sturdy court house, which is now the museum—and who is to say it doesn't serve as important a purpose as when officialdom propped their heels on hard wood desks and murderers were tried in the big courtroom upstairs (notably the DeAutremonts).

Jacksonville is lucky for Peter Britt lived there and he was a photographer, such a one as comes no more than once in a generation. The pictures he took of stern old miners with eyes gazing steadily behind whiskers and of bedizened Indian women in buckskins and porcupine quills and the blue beads of the red people especially loved. And his pictures are still good although the suns of a hundred years have tried to fade them.

Jacksonville has an Odd-Fellows hall to house a lodge es-

tablished in 1860, a Masonic hall in use for more than 80 years, a drug store boasting descent from a saloon with the identical swinging doors through which swayed the exultant miner and the discouraged gambler to test their emotion by increasing it.

There are dozens of old buildings, many in the original state. A visit to Jacksonville is to step back a hundred years by overlooking the paved streets and the cement sidewalks and picturing the passers-by as miners in boots and beards instead of moderns with pensions and patience. Old things hang about, harness, a scythe and cradle, music boxes, tops from old Kentucky whisky barrels, firearms enough to show the progress of man's lethal ability from the muzzle loader to the machine gun. Why, a man could spend a life time looking. But he needs someone to help his stand aghast, to listen to his exuberances and to occasionally drag him away to his meals.

In the museum proper Miss Mary Hanley can explain every item, having placed them herself but about the town there are many things that need the services of a guide or someone from the days of old when work was so hard few men had time or imagination for wickedness except of the viler sort.

The old Beekman bank was reopened Monday night after a program. It has been restored by experts. The same signs hang on the walls, the same steel pens protrude from the wire holder, the same gold scales reach their delicate balance and the same small, steel spectacles lay on the desk where Ben Beekman placed them before he went home to die without heirs.

Perhaps you are young and only interested in where you are going. So, let us say that where you have been is probably more interesting and, inasmuch as man is a creature of habit, will have the most to do with your eventual destination.
