Portland Public Docks Continues Cargo Lead!

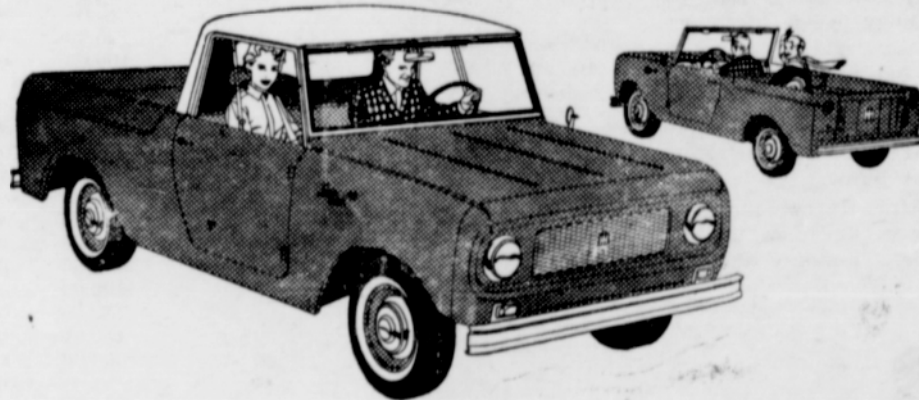
