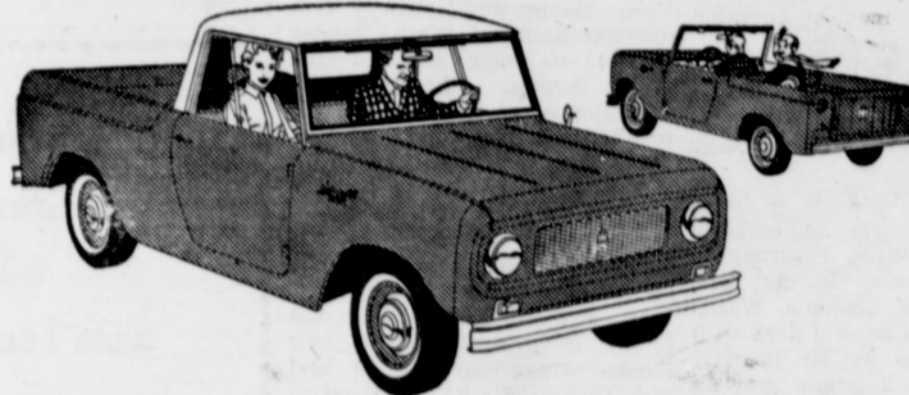
shower for the lodge.

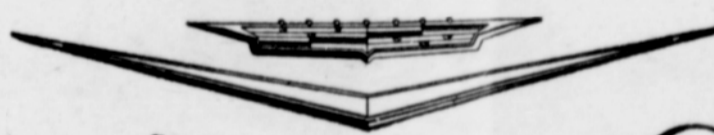

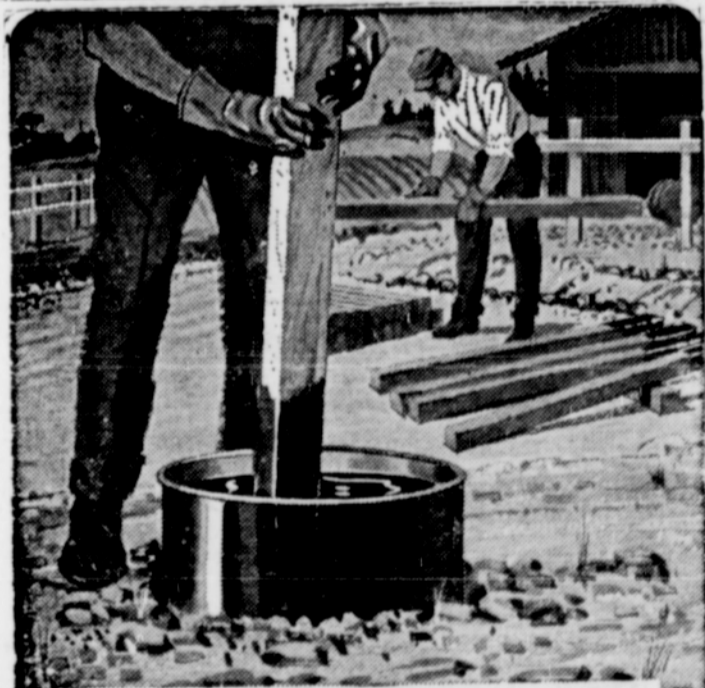
