County Agricultural Agent

USDA has announced that a new agency will assume most of the functions of the former Commodity Stabilization Service. While no change has been made in the state and county operation, the state and county offices will in the future be called Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) offices.

Perennial Weed Eradication

Now and anytime is the right time for locating and eradicating perennial weeds. Continued increase attention is being given perennials in the county. Objective is eradication of perennial noxious weeds. Special attention has been given to White Top, Canada Thistle, Russian Knapweed and Dalmatian Toadflax, so far this year.

Cooperation in perennial eradication has been secured from the state highway, Union Pacific RR, cities and farmers. Last week perennial weeds on the Sherman branch line were sprayed in a cooperated program with the rail-

gram needs to be voluntary. We hope consideration can be given this by all ranchers.

Irrigated Pasture Trials
Excellent response to nitrogen has been demonstrated on the W. E. Bruckert irrigated grass-clover pasture near Klondike. Ammonium Sulfate was applied during April at 20, 40, and 60 pounds of actual nitrogen. Plots were harvested last week and yields calculated.

On a dry weight basis the check produced 625 pounds acre. 20 lbs nitrogen - 1410, 40 lbs N - 2350, and 60 pounds acre of grass-clover hay. Irrigated pastures are not designed for hay production so hay yields are low, but pasture production is great. The above yield typifies response expected from nitrogen. The 40 pound nitrogen rate produced a ton of dry feed at less than \$5.00 for fertilizer. The 60 pound rate was not as efficient and definitely the breaking point. This again demonstrates that smaller amounts of nitrogen more often is more economical.

German Alfalfa
Several farmers in northern Sherman County have had a problem with German Alfalfa or Devils Shoestring weed. A trial plot was established in the Hildred Zell ranch in summer fallow last June. Readings of results last week are not sensational and no perfect eradication method was discovered.

Best materials for foliage active spraying were 2,4-DTP and 2,4-D emulsifiable acid. Both gave 60 to 70 percent reduction. TBA at ten pounds per acre, half the recommended Morning Glory rate gave similar results. Further testing and trial work is needed on this weed.
