STRIPE RUST AND ASTHMATIC PATIENTS

Dr. E. Berg, Sherman-Wasco Health department, has provided information to us relative to health considerations in relation to dust from stripe rust of wheat. Information from Dr. Berg was secured in consultation with Dr. Sullivan, Occupational Health section, State Board of Health.

"Inhalation of dust from stripe rust (Puccinia glumarum) has been known to produce a lung condition described as a granulomatous interstitial pneumonitis. Symptoms associated with this condition include fever, cough, blood tinged sputum, weakness and general debility. The disease process may run a rather prolonged course and may leave some permanent residual after effects. Among those exposed to dust from stripe rust, the attack rate for the lung condition described is very small. There is fairly good evidence that those most likely to be affected are individuals who are particularly susceptible to fungus type infections. It is doubtful if the rust produces a specific disease, but probably acts as a lung irritant which produces symptoms and disease process mentioned previously. There has not been a great deal written or described about this condition, most likely because it does not occur too frequently. There have been several reports describing a condition called 'farmer's lung' which is probably due to this type

of infection or irritation.

"In view of the very small attack rate and the unpleasantness and inconvenience of wearing an adequate masking device, I doubt if it would be feasible to recommend general use of masks for those operating combines in rust infested fields. Adequate masks would be very uncomfortable in hot weather and the filters would have to be changed frequently. It would, no doubt, be advisable for those suffering from chronic chest conditions such as asthma, or those known to be sensitive to fungus infections, to wear some type of protective mask during harvest operations."

Seed Certification

Forty acres of Alpine barley on the F. L. Watkins ranch passed field inspection for certification this past week. Following harvest, seed purity and germination tests must be run and passed for certification to be placed on any seed.

Next week further field inspections for certification will be made at the Sherman branch experiment station. Acreage of Nordand Crested Wheatgrass, Spray barley, Hudson barley and the new shorty semi-dwarf wheat will be checked by Jack Waud, extension seed certification specialist.

Much of the Alpine barley has Flynn, wheat, or even rye. Good seed is at a premium. Last year the following planted some acreage of certified Flynn which now
