ABOUT AGRICULTURE

Research workers at Washington State University, observed that the occurrence of blood spots in eggs increased when the level of vitamin A was below 1,100 U. S. P. units per pound of feed. Vitamin A levels in the range of 1,200 and 1,600 per pound resulted in minimum blood spot incidence. Stepping the vitamin A up more to levels as high as 15,000 units did not result in any further reduction in blood spots.

Caged Bird Protection

Preliminary results from trials conducted at OSU indicate that egg production rates will be as good whether one or two birds are housed in a 12-inch cage.

During the colder months of the year, there was a decrease in production in cages housing two birds when they were fed a low energy feed. When the birds received a high energy ration, however, there was no difference.

Feed efficiency was slightly better when two birds were housed together.

In group cages, egg production was better for birds given one square foot of space than where just three-fourths of a square foot was allowed per bird.

Grover Long, Wasco, who lives on Tad McCoy place uses cages for his layers. Long is the largest egg producer in the county, running about 400 hens. The cage system has worked well for him and could be used by anyone even a family flock. Cost of investment will run near a dollar per bird.
