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ALL THIS FUSS

Anyone who gets excited over the moves to increase the army at the same time as there is talk about war over Berlin is not informed about politics.

During Eisenhower's administration the navy had a man close to him and the nation built atomic powered submarines that can go down under the water and stay for weeks which was Admiral Rickover's idea of a defense weapon.

Also the air force has new gadgets aplenty, big bombers, fast fighters and atomic missiles and rockets to make Jules Verne an old fogey.

The army felt neglected. But this president called up retired General Taylor who quit because he was mad over presumed slights to the army. So now we are going to build up the army, too. Small arms, bazookas and all the retail killing tools.

In order to make this extra expense look reasonable we must rattle the saber and that old excuse of beleaguered Berlin is the best at hand.

When any administration, not only in this country, but any where and at any time in history, gets in trouble it starts a little or a lot of war talk so the people will rally to it as a matter of patriotism. In the present case there is a desire to pressure some very bad bills through congress while the scare is on.

There is danger, of course, the increased army men may not leave enough jobs to the unemployed, the bigger contracts may not start the whirl of inflation fast enough to overcome the damage the new taxes will cause. In that case there will be more big talk and more armies, etc. That could lead to war. Sounding off in high places started war in 1941 and again over Korea. It can happen again.

COLLEGE PRES'S PAY

The board of higher education allowed publication of the pay received by heads of state schools and coaches last week. It was not very surprising. Casanova gets around \$17,000 in a very risky business, for a couple poor teams and his head would roll no matter what his record.

Presidents draw down what looks like good money in a much less dangerous sort of job. College presidents often stay on the job until superannuated. Seldom are they fired and it seems to be nice work if you can get it.

What surprised us—and still does—is that it is possible to get so much money for the work. Few college presidents have impressed us as being so unique in intelligence or personality as to be worth much more than common folks. They know their job and they do it. But it seems likely that dozens of other men could do as well.

We have had in Oregon several temporary college presidents who kept the halls swept and the footballers geared and the diplomas going out on schedule about as well as the more formal and more expensive ones. Maybe the job is over rated.

EASTERN OREGON

We are happy to be informed that eastern Oregon county courts have held a couple of meetings to talk over problems. This area has not been represented, perhaps because of its present alliance over development of atomic missiles in the Columbia valley.

An organization of eastern Oregon counties would be helpful but wouldn't be as useful as an organization of eastern Oregon citizens of all kinds dedicated to study and action about affairs of concern to eastern Oregon residents.

Eastern Oregon has many problems that are of concern to western Oregon and which eastern Oregon is uninterested in. Since eastern Oregon has lost most of its membership in the legislature it is time it formed an organization to consolidate its position

and to further inform what few legislators remain. Not only that but to study and take a stand on such things as school legislation, taxation, highways, electric power development, all of major importance and on which this part of the state has special problems.

NEW TAX GIMMICK

Congress is talking about a new way to get some money which is the duty of a house ways and means committee. We make no objection but we do wish other congressmen would not put such a burden on that committee.

The proposal is to have a withholding tax on interest and dividends of one-sixth. Congress fears that some people have not been reporting such income.

As for the big holder of stocks and bonds the loss is probably minor for he has his tax done by experts anyway and has enough money anyway so he probably does not do much chiseling on actual income. He may buy tax exempts to evade taxes, however.

There has been a campaign to encourage as many Americans as possible to buy stocks and have a part in American business. Thousands now set aside small amounts each month until they have enough to buy a share or two of some favored stock. It is hard on the corporation bookkeeper but it does spread interest in business around.

For years we have had a campaign to urge young people to save toward the purchase of government bonds and the payroll savings plan has given the government good income and the people good investment. "E" bonds would not come under the tax at present but other bonds would.

So now the government proposes to take away a sixth of such income at the source. Most such payment are made quarterly so the government would have the sixth for a good part of the year before the taxpayer got around to figuring how much he did owe and ask for a refund. Certainly the percentage of tax payers whose income tax would figure out to an even sixth would be small. Surely at least 90 percent of the taxpayers would have some coming back or some additional to pay. Think what a job for the computers!

The government is so money hungry congress may pass this

crazy bill even though it does get a list of every dividend paid by every corporation and can check on everybody if it chooses which it will have to do anyway.

YOU NEVER KNOW

We read that a maker of tin cans has a scheme to make millions of both cans and dollars. He wants to put the nation's surplus of wheat together with the nation's fear of atomic blast and make a good tough can that can be filled with wheat for storage in burrows—like sage rats do for winter, you know.

We commend the can maker for an alert mind. We think he could get the support of this administration which is interested in promoting civil defense by burrow building, desirous of reducing the surplus wheat and anxious to get its share of taxes from the maker of cans.

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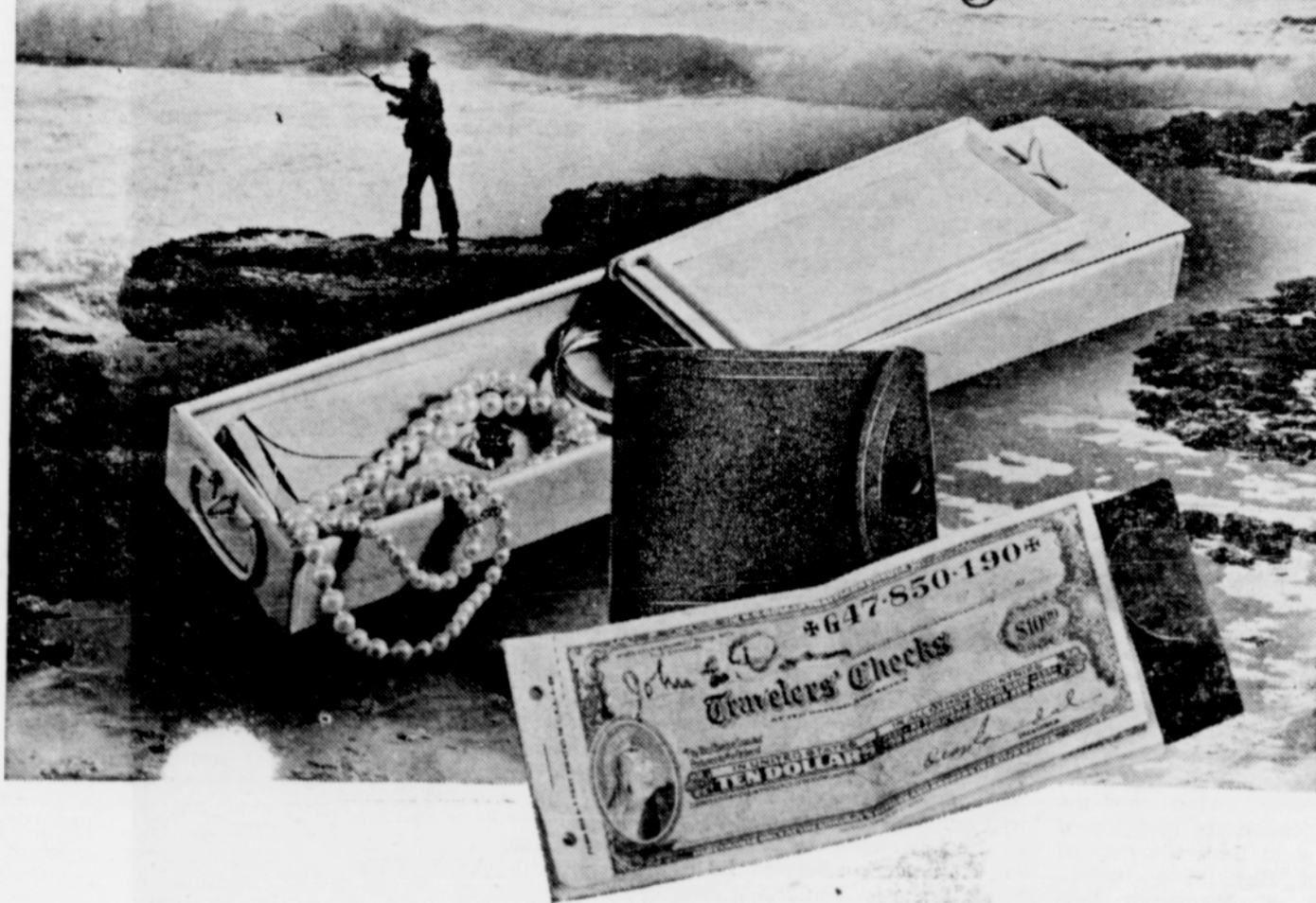
