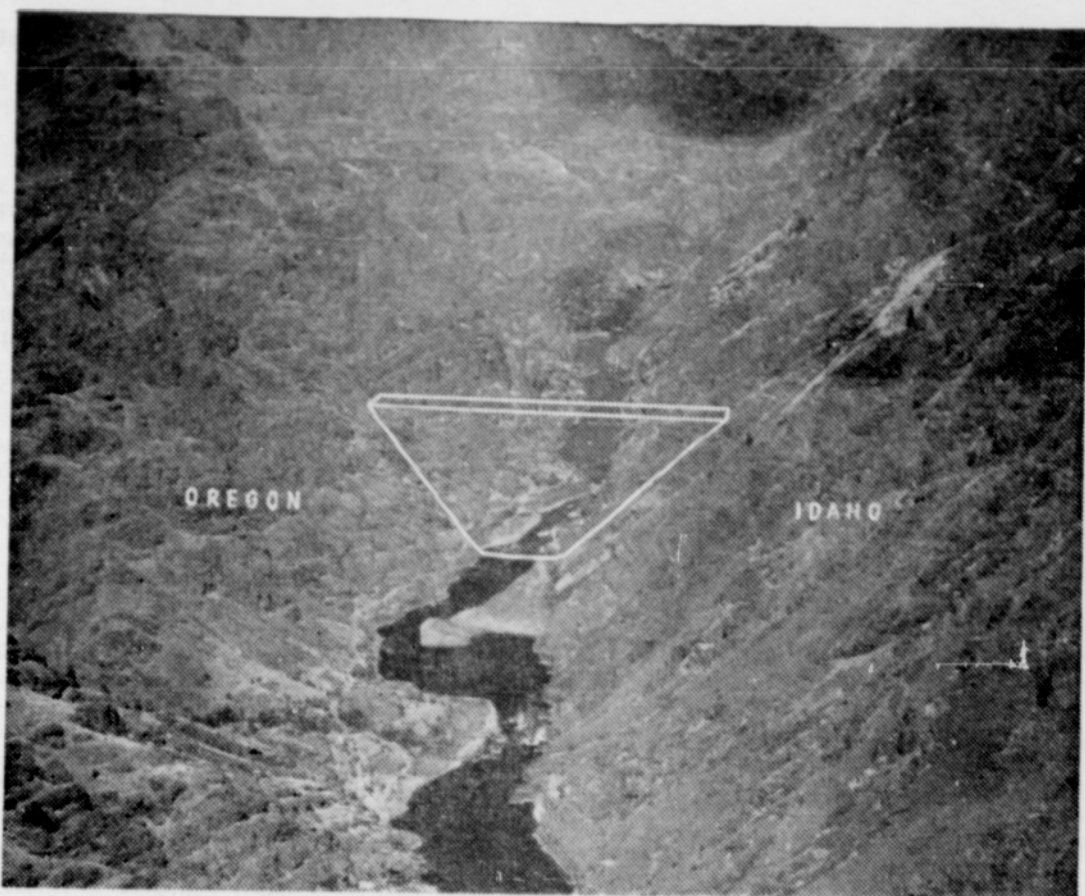




Armed with drilling rigs and blasting powder, workmen are driving a modern access road toward this rugged site in mile-deep Hells Canyon where Idaho Power Company will build the Hells Canyon dam. Work on the pioneer road leading into North America's deepest gorge began July 27, officially launching construction of the final huge project in the three-dam, 1,000,000 kilowatt development started by Idaho Power in 1955. Hells Canyon dam, indicated by white outline on this aerial photo, will be a 320-foot-high concrete gravity structure capable of generating 400,000 kilowatts of electricity. Its construction is expected to be one of the most challenging projects in dam-building history, due to the narrow canyon's steep terrain. The access-road construction—first step in the Hells Canyon project—will be a major task itself as workmen push the two-lane route some 23 miles downstream in rocky mountainsides high above the Snake River. The road begins at a new bridge now being built across the Snake near the company's Oxbow dam to replace the existing outmoded Ballard interstate bridge.
