Clean Up Time Here

Clean up your fences and rye patches urges Martin Zimmerman. Cheatgrass and rye can now be eliminated. Atrazine, a recent development in farm chemicals, can prevent annual growth in fences, roads and other areas where these weeds are not wanted. This material can be used to make firebreaks around buildings and farmsteads, etc.

Four pounds of 80% atrazine in 20-40 gallons of water will effectively control all annual growth if applied before growth starts. Any time after September 15th. If growth starts before spraying 2 lbs. of 50% atrazine per acre should be added to the spray mixture.

Atrazine may be applied after September 15th and through February with good results. Atrazine is a wettable powder and must have agitation. 20-40 gallons per acre is recommended.
