The same workshop will be given later in the year in the Wasco area.



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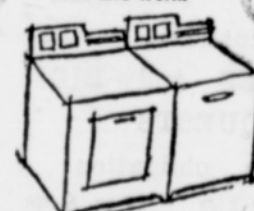
