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HIGH COST OF POLITICS
 The announcement that the federal government would put an establishment in or near Corvallis to study water pollution and that Senator Wayne Morse was the man responsible was made last week. The cost is said to be around four million dollars which probably means six.

It is an example of how far the administration will go to elect men to support it. We expect nothing from the plant after Corvallis business has been stimulated by the wages of builders. There is the certainty of higher taxes.

We are certain that the reason for locating such a plant in Oregon was to aid Senator Morse and attach him to the administration. It is normal politics and utterly deplorable.

HUNTING
 Hunters from Sherman County used to leave home two or three days before the season opened and travel long distances before setting up camp in some strange and timbered place where deer were thought to live. That was before there were any deer in this county.

Now hunters arise at nearly a normal hour on the day the bucks become free game and with luck return home in time to go to work with venison for the winter.

The latter method is much easier and less expensive but it surely is not as much fun. The trip and camping out were the reasons for many hunter's interest for the temporary hardships of camp life have an appeal to men and women who live a soft life 360 days of the year. Some little proof that they are still youthful and rugged is valued. But with deer in the back quarter there is no excuse for making a trip of it.

Someone in Portland is teaching some of the rules of survival and that makes sense. Most of us have lost the ability to do the things necessary for living with nature. Turn off the electricity and a good share of Americans wouldn't survive—wouldn't want to. The skills that were known two generations ago are gone and few are alive to recall them.

Breaking horses to work, building harness, killing animals, baking bread, drying meat, even the ability to walk ten miles a day are gone to say nothing of other skills that our method of living has rendered unnecessary.

The government sounds scared, talks big and acts little, boasts today and trembles tomorrow, has no solutions except to appropriate money for something or other. It is probably normal for politicians to cry with alarm every time there is a chance to get their name in the papers but this bunch is overdoing it.

It is about time the nation sat down and decided that individually all are going to die and that the time and the manner make much less difference than what they did while here.

REAPPORTIONMENT
 Pursuant to the constitution Secretary of State Howell Appling has presented the supreme court with an apportionment plan that he thinks will be in accordance with the provisions put into the constitution by popular vote a few years ago. If the court approves it, it will be the way to divide legislators from now on.

Mr. Appling in his letter to the press regarding the plan says: "Because, carried to its logical extreme, representation based solely on population would wholly stifle the voice of the minority and destroy the precious concept of local representation. I shall continue to work in behalf of a constitutional amendment that will permit the adoption of the federal plan of representation in Oregon."

The plan submitted is therefore according to the constitution, not according to Appling's wishes. For example Sherman, Gilliam, Morrow, Umatilla and Wheeler counties would be in the same legislative district and have two members of the house. That disfranchise four counties, in fact, if not in intent. Four of these counties have larger tillable acres than any other in the state, produce a big share of the wheat and yet would have one thirtieth of the representation in the house.

The principle of apportionment by population alone is not an American one. The men who wrote the nation's constitution and settled the quarrels between the small and large colonies devised a more workable plan than that. In order to have the two legislative houses different so that bills are approached from more than one concept, two methods of apportionment are necessary. The kind of legislation we have been getting from a legislature based on population only is reason enough to change.

Eastern Oregon will have to get more representation than it will

under the Appling plan or secede from the state. It may not secede politically, but it can surely secede economically. If this isn't enough to make a suitable course of action they can be slaves for awhile.
