FEWER EMPLOYED IN ANY INDUSTRY NOW

Farming is only one of many problem areas of work feeling the impact of technological change, reports Mrs. Elvera Horrell, OSU extension agricultural economist.

She points out that the number of farmers and farm workers in the U. S. has been cut in half in the past four decades. In the last 25 years, particularly, there has been a persistent shift of workers out of farming into other jobs.

In railroad transportation, for instance, the need for workers declined nearly 40 percent from 1947 to 1959. In manufacturing, the employment peak was reached in 1943 and has never been attained since. Coal miners are another group facing widespread unemployment.

In industry, the number of white collar employees has risen, while the number of blue collar workers has dropped, especially in unskilled jobs.

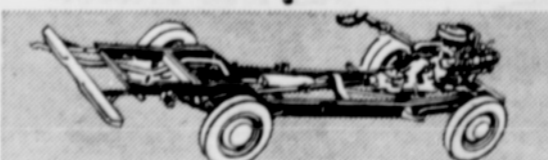
