### County Ramblin's

Next year Sherman County teenage hunters will be required to have a certificate of competence in handling fire arms to receive an Oregon hunting license. A law passed by the last session of the legislature requires that young hunters under 17 after January 1, 1962 will need to earn a certificate of competence in safe handling of firearms before they can get their hunting license. The certificate will be issued to those who pass the Oregon Hunter Safety Training program.

The 4-H Gun Safety project is one way for young hunters to get their certificate. The other way is through classes taught by the Oregon State Game Commission. The 4-H Gun Safety project is divided into five phases, the 4-H Safe Shooter, the 4-H Marksman, 4-H Sharp Shooter, 4-H Expert Rifleman and 4-H Hunter. The first phase, includes the Oregon Hunters Safety Training program, those who complete this project automatically receive their certificate of competence which enables them to purchase their hunting license.

Adult leaders are needed for this 4-H Gun Safety program here in the county. The adult leaders must pass a training test before handling this program. David Moore, Stan Coelsch and Curly Moss are certified instructors that we know about presently in the county. Any other people in the other portions of the county concerned about hunter safety and developing a program so that their youngsters can obtain the hunting license are asked to check with the county extension office relative to organization of 4-H Gun Safety projects.

### Medusahead

Medusahead is rearing its ugly head, is probably the most serious new wheat pest on Oregon range lands. The plant is a name sake of the snake haired Greek goddess Medusa. Ranges in Idaho, California, Oregon and Washington and seriously threatened with invasion by Medusahead which is an unpalatable grass that has spread rapidly in these states during the past few years. Medusahead has been located in Sherman County in the finnaign and Sherar areas. The size of the infestation is not known at this time.

The main objections to Medusahead is that it is not palatable to livestock and that it may cause actual damage when consumed because of the long barbed beards on the seed head. These beards may injure the eyes, nose or mouth of an animal and some ranchers report that (lumpy jaw) disease in cattle has resulted from beards becoming lodged under the tongues of grazing stock, somewhat similar but to a greater degree than cheatgrass.

Medusahead is a winter annual germinating in the fall and laying dormant during the winter and then grows slowly during the spring to complete maturity by early July. Its mature height is

from 8 to 24 inches with a few slender leaves up to 4 inches long and a bushy spike with beards from 2 to 4 inches in length. The plant often completely invades an area and grows so that a layer of dead plants and seeds up to inches deep may be deposited on the soil surface. This virtually eliminates grazing in the area and also creates fire hazard since the material is easily combustible.

Experimental work for control is being conducted by Oregon State University agricultural station which includes chemical treatment, burning and tillage followed by range reseeding with desirable range plants. Some experimental chemical treatment trials were applied in the southern part of Sherman County to determine the resistance of the native bunch grass and crested wheat grass to chemicals that might be used to eradicate Medusahead this past year. Trials were located on the Max Brown and Phil von Borstel ranches. We presently know that atrazine at 2 to 4 lbs. per acre will eradicate this weedy grass plant. The experimental work underway is to try to determine the most economical use of chemicals for control programs.

Farmers in doubt of presents of this plant and its identification are asked to contact county extension agent's office for assistance in correcting or keeping in check this serious range plant.
