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HOW TO KILL CHEATGRASS AND OTHER WINTER WEEDS IN GRAIN STUBBLE

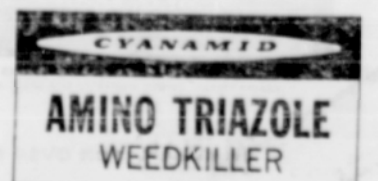
