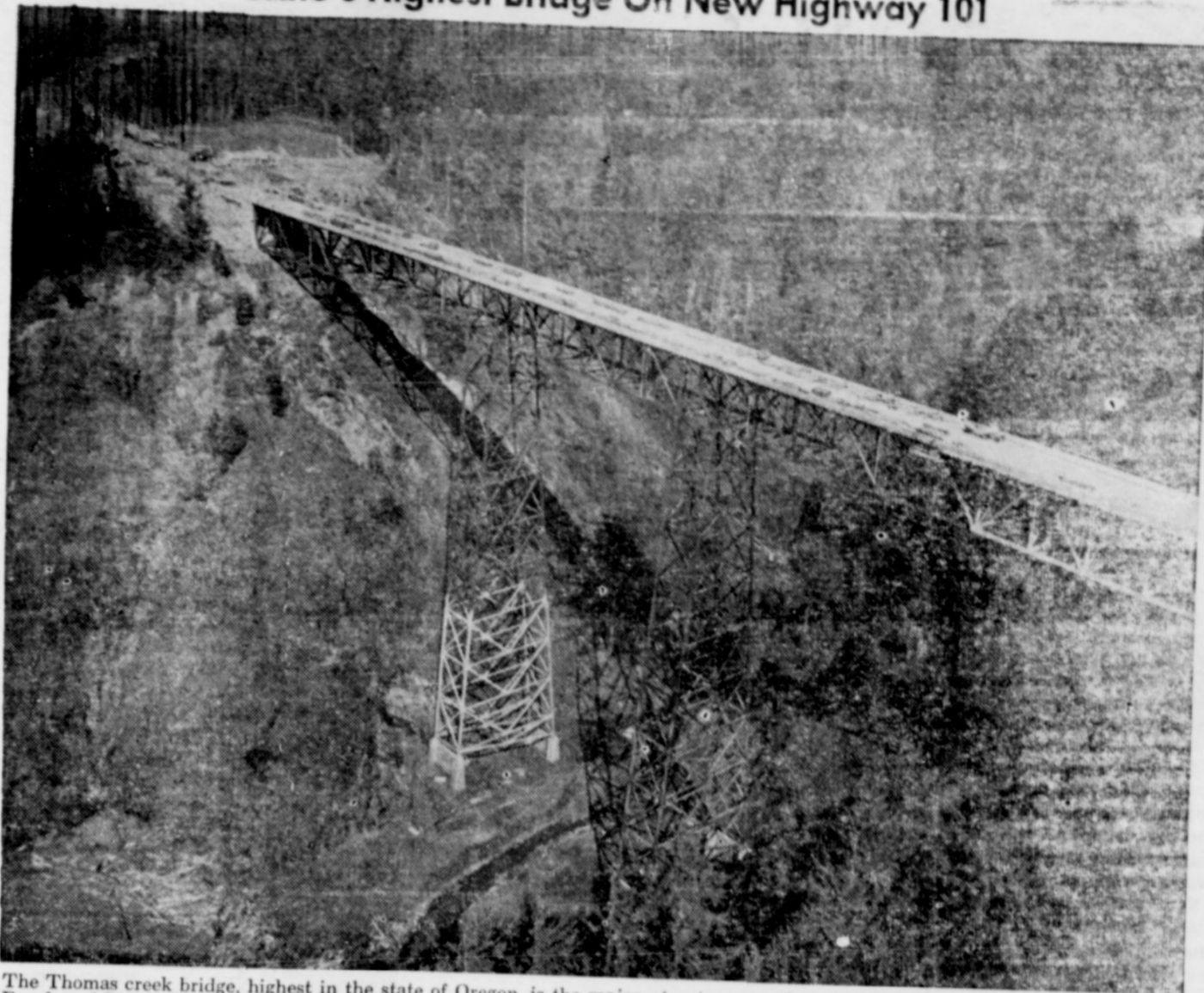

Scarcity Cuts Stock Of White Wheat

The following was prepared by Marion Thomas, extension economist, Oregon State university.

Scarce supplies and heavy export commitments have pushed white wheat prices up, but do not necessarily assure further hikes. Much depends on government export policy. Now authorizations for white wheat sales under the 480 program may be held low enough to keep wheat prices from rising much more this fall. This is not certain, although new authorizations were suspended temporarily in July. Officials wanted to learn more about the quality of white wheat that would be available from the new crop before allocating additional amounts under this program. Not more than 3 million bushels of previous authorizations remained uncommitted. Last year, over 75 million bushels of Pacific Northwest wheat moved under this program. Less white wheat will move under the program this year because

pararily in July. Officials wanted to learn more about the quality of white wheat that would be available from the new crop before allocating additional amounts under this program. Not more than 3 million bushels of previous authorizations remained uncommitted. Last year, over 75 million bushels of Pacific Northwest wheat moved under this program. Less white wheat will move under the program this year because there will not be that much available from the smaller carry over and smaller crop. One thing is clear: The government's selling price has evaporated as a ceiling on white wheat prices until next April and perhaps longer.
