We practiced reining, balancing, training methods, a Cavalette pattern, some exercises to strengthen muscles and some drill movements. Randy Lemley, reporter

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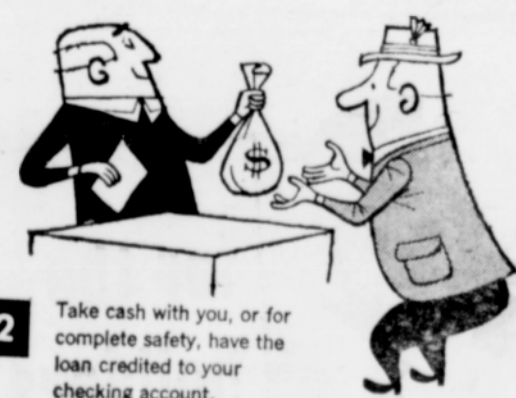
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
