The Christians brought it on themselves in the beginning when the struggling church adopted the Roman saturnalia as one of its important feast days. We find the Christmas season one of the very nicest. Everyone seems a little more relaxed, less selfish and generally more pleasant than at other times. It is almost as if the adults, too, were expecting Santa and wanted to be on their good behavior.

We will make no effort to change it and if some spend too much they will do so for what seems a kindly act.

THIS CRAZY WORLD

This has been a bad week for idealists. India attacked little Goa which has belonged to Portugal for over 400 years. India said it was a colony and captured it instead of fighting the red Chinese that are on the northern border.

Anti-colonialism is going strong

and the world is splitting into a mess of little nations, none large enough to defend themselves or earn economic independence. The day when progress was any change from heterogeneity to homogeneity is gone; now it is the reverse. It will probably end when the anti-colonialists want to establish colonies of their own for it must be remembered the new nations are no more moral than the old, only hungrier.

And had the old colonial nations had the nerve and the solidarity they might have prevented the disintegration of their empires and this splintering of peoples. The Indians, so recently protesting the use of power, use it themselves.

The United Nations will do nothing, for Russia sides with India. And the United Nations is busy in Katanga, showing the Katanga boss, Tshombe, that he must join the rest of the Congo. Anti-colonialism is not for Katanga. The world seems to think solvent Katanga must stay with Congo which can't earn a living, so it will probably all turn red and give Russia two victories, easy victories, which this nation aided.

And the president and wife went to South America with some Marines and two armored cars and, according to the radio, told the rulers there that they must divide up the property or the people would do it themselves. May be true. But it comes poorly from the son of a very rich man who shows no signs of following the advice and we are sure it would not be tolerated if it were not accompanied by millions of those soothing American dollars.
