VACCINATION URGED Oregon's modified - certified Bang's free status is dependent upon the success of the state's program for vaccination of heifer calves against brucellosis. Bang's recertification entails testing a specified number of animals over a three-year period and, most important of all not less than 80 percent of eligible heifers retained on ranches and farms must be vaccinated.

There are innumerable advantages to both cattlemen and dairymen in maintaining an adequate vaccination program. It insures a clean herd with a minimum of calf losses from abortion; vaccinated cattle may move across state lines without being tested; a vaccinated heifer is worth more on

the open market; and it protects the public health. Calf vaccination is free. With the present low incidence of Bang's disease, universal vaccination, together with market cattle testing and milk ring test, can beat the disease, in the market cattle phase cattle entering market channels are blood tested; in milk ring screening tests, individual animals of herds showing reaction are blood tested. Both tests spot reactors.
