Truckers Make More Last Year

Despite declining revenue, truckers operating in Oregon made a greater net profit in 1961 than in 1960 according to statistics released this week by the state public utility commissioner.

The report shows that by maintaining a closer hold on their operating expenses the truckers were able to reduce their operating rates, on the average, from 95.93 to 94.01. On a dollar basis, their net operating revenue increasing from \$16,511,687 for the first nine months in 1960 to \$24,040,018 for the same period in 1961.

Of the \$401,576,773 total revenue going to the industry in 1961 \$244,149,106 went to the 55 major truck lines operating in the state.
