Food supplies will continue abundant in Oregon and the United States, but retail prices will reflect changes in supplies of some items. Shoppers who note these prospects can make their food

dollars go farther. This is the way Barbara McCandless, Oregon State University extension consumer marketing specialist, sees the coming year in an article entitled "Changes Coming in Food Supply, Price" in OSU's new issue of the Oregon Farm and Market Outlook circular. Prices are expected to average close to 1961 for red meats. U. S. red meat supplies are forecast at 161 pounds per capita, slightly more than in 1961. Slightly more beef and pork is foreseen, but smaller mutton and lamb supplies are in the picture. Consumption per person this year is forecast at 87 pounds beef, 63½ pounds pork and 4.7 pounds lamb and mutton.

Poultry products will be in ample supply and prices of broilers may average below 1961 in the first few months. Egg prices are also expected to be somewhat lower than in 1961, while turkey prices during the first six to eight months are expected to continue in line with present levels, Miss McCandless said.

Plentiful supplies of dairy products will tend to keep retail prices through 1962 at the level of last year, she noted, with shoppers continuing to switch to items with lower fat content. Fish use is expected to be close to year earlier rates with retail prices likely to remain at least moderately higher this year than last. Retail prices for food fats in 1962 are expected to be about the same as in 1961, with demand expected to be about 46 pounds (fat content) per person, about the same as in recent years.

Total supplies of fresh and processed fruits in prospect from now until mid-year are moderately larger than last year, Miss McCandless says. During the coming year, indications are that some fresh fruit will retail for lower prices while the prices of processed fruits will remain about the same.

Moderately more canned vegetables are likely to be available than a year earlier and there are materially more frozen vegetables available this year than last, with all major items in larger supply. Because of increased costs of processing and distribution, food shoppers are likely to be asked to pay a little more for most processed items compared to a year earlier, she noted.

Supplies of potatoes available this winter are substantially larger than a year ago with retail prices moderately lower. Supplies of sweet potatoes, however, are down slightly and retail prices are expected to average a little higher than last year.

Rye Is Big Job For Wheat Farmers

Special attention is being called this fall to our number two weed problem—RYE. Rye has caused Sherman farmers tens of thousands of dollars in reduced yields, dockage and lower grades. Rye threatens much of our cropland acres unless concentrated attention is started.

Fence row and waste land rye can be effectively eradicated with chemicals now on the market. Cost will run around ten dollars per acre. Field infestation of rye is more difficult to handle. Full discing, of stubble to get rye to germinate, spring seeding clipping and roguing are mechanical field methods. We are on the verge of having a chemical for selective removal of rye from wheat or barley. This yet needs further demonstration.

Rye is a serious county problem. The Weed Council and County Court have encouraged more attention to rye. The County Extension office is available to help with methods and procedures. We hope each farmer will survey his land closely this fall to determine his rye problem, if any.
