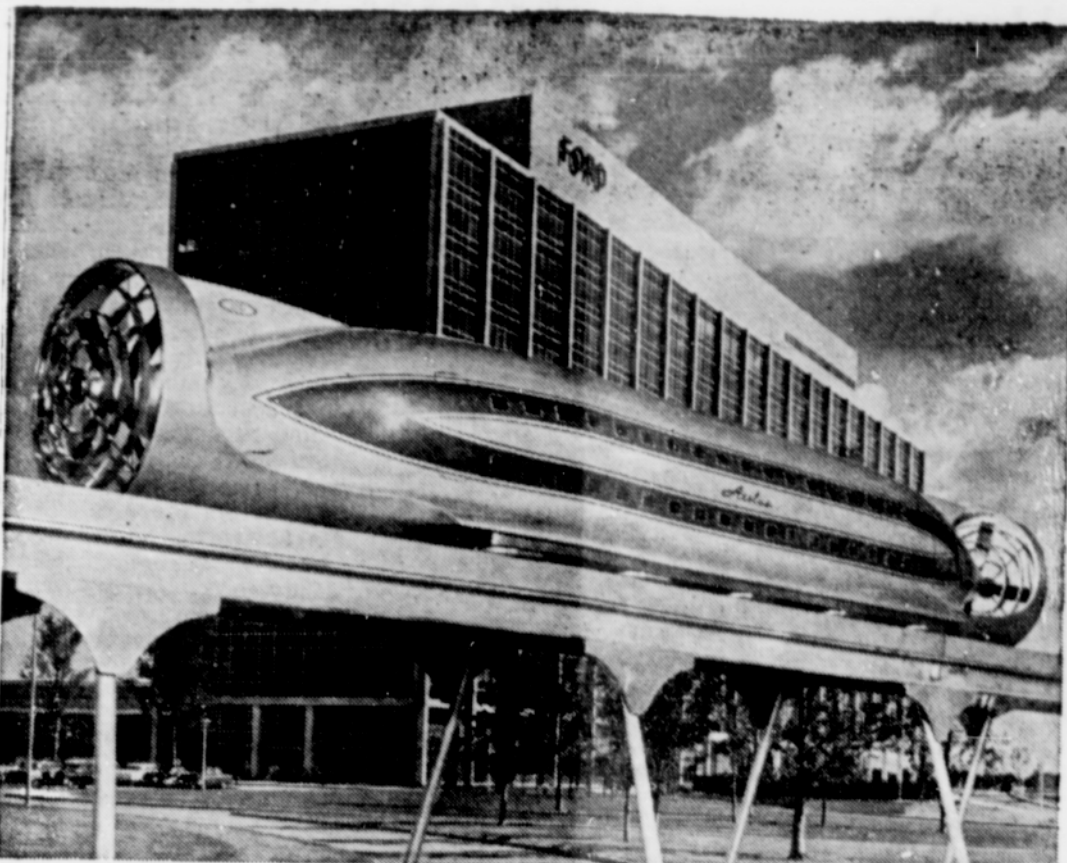

Boys Taking Safety

Training This Winter

In the month of January more than 2,200 Oregon youngsters successfully completed the hunter safety training course offered by the game commission. This number was the highest monthly figure on record and brings the total number of young people trained to more than 21,000 since June, 1959.

More than 2,500 volunteer instructors and a great many co-operating groups have made it

possible to spread this training into all parts of the state. There are instructors in every county and in almost every community. Multnomah county, of course, has the largest number of instructors, 390, with sparsely settled Wheeler county at the other end of the line with seven instructors.

Since the training became mandatory on January 1 for young hunters using firearms, training activities have speeded up markedly. Cal Giesler, hunter safety supervisor for the commission, estimates that 30,000 children will receive the training this year.
