A COMMUNITY IS REBORN

The first party in the new Legion hall was held Saturday night and a goodly crowd was there despite snow on the ground and the mercury but little above zero. They had a good time, the middle aged adults and their flock of children from hesitant adolescents to roistering toddlers. And that is what the hall is good for. They danced the old dances quadrilles and set form dances seldom seen, the primary classes and the middle graders of elementary school, the little girls darning in and out and around like chipper sparrows to make their more awkward partners seem almost gallant. They made a spectator feel that it was truly fun to be a little girl and to dance before a crowd in a new dress. And the elders did a Virginia reel. They sang and peddled cakes and sold baskets and talked about the old days and the new days and the days to come in this new hall, built in proof that veterans remember that they are associated together "For God and Country" and that country includes the home town and that "to inculcate a sense of individual obligation to the community, state and nation" are not mere words to be mumbled at meetings.

The hall is fine, strong, well built, well lighted and comfortably heated. And it will be useful for years and years and more, until these little girls are wrinkled and gray and tell their grand children how they danced at the first party in that hall. But, fine as it is, the hall is but a symbol. If it were used to store oats in it would still be a symbol, a symbol of a community's spirit. Halls are made out of cement and brick and mortar; communities are made out of spirit. The will and determination to do something is a sign of resurgence of the pioneer spirit and we glory in it. The men who built the hall will be doubly repaid in the satisfaction of demonstrated self-reliance. They are better because of it and the community is better because of them. We are proud.

TAX PROTEST

We read that a group of tax associations are going to hold a joint meeting, no doubt for the purpose of protesting to the legislature about the rapidly growing rate of taxation. That is a very simple solution.

It is also a very good solution. Taxpayers are themselves largely to blame for letting taxes get so big for they have done their complaining on street corners instead of forming an organization and going to government agencies with their program for some economy.

The job will be harder than it would have been twenty years ago because so many tax eating agencies have become imbued with the absolute necessity of their continuance and growth. Most of them have some slight value and nearly all of them have a vast ambition to hire more people and spend more money. Irate taxpayers can control them if they want to badly enough. Incidentally the state budget 29 years ago totaled some 17 million. It has grown 20 times while the population has grown 50% and the dollar has dropped by more than half.
