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"WHEN, IN THE COURSE OF HUMAN EVENTS—"

The most recent verbal battle between eastern Oregon and the city has made it appear some days as if eastern Oregon were a sycophant begging crumbs at the postern gate of the western Oregon castle, to be modified with a pat on the head or back and a kind word or two about our scenery, our wheat or our fish. To such attitudes we do not subscribe.

Eastern Oregon is a different land than the Willamette valley. Residents in that rainy region know it and are willing to patronize us in their feeling of inferiority. When we permit ourselves to be talked into compliance we are being weak and unworthy of our heritage.

We have to get away from it, politically if possible; economically in any event. We cannot develop with the Willamette valley on our backs like the old man of the sea. Politically we are in a bind with no control over the taxes we pay nor the use of the money. That a majority of our legislators voted for the inequitable measures to direct use of highway funds by politics is proof of our thralldom. Compromise always works against us and we are always losers in the legislative game. Witness the crumbs thrown to us in the legislative apportionment proposal.

Let us join with Idaho or Nevada, either of which has an apportionment system more American than Oregon; let us trade with Boise or Spokane or San Francisco where we are customers, not poor relation; let us make use of such governmental devices as are available to achieve political independence (county charters are an example); let us declare our independence in words as ringing as those of the forefathers of our country and let the Willamette valley petition for pats on the head or back.

The city needs us more than we need it. Its services can be duplicated—at less cost—in dozens of places; our resources have made Portland big and powerful and if used at home could do the same for us. It is time for a declaration of independence.

A JUG OF MOONSHINE

Newspapers in these parts have dipped into nostalgia this past week with a picture of a plain crock dug up at the Paulsen Kaseberg ranch at Locust Grove and apparently containing a liquid that had most of the qualities of moonshine liquor but not the power.

The presence of water about the jug and over its cork had permitted the liquid to become diluted until it was no more than a feeble shadow of the original strength. Moonshine was a potent little thirty years ago and we doubt if mere age could weaken it very much.

Burying moonshine was a common practice and for many reasons. An officer might be suspicious, the hired man or the wife might be set upon confiscation (probably for different reasons), just to keep it until the Fourth of July. Anyway it was found a couple feet underground where it had probably been for 30 years or more and we must say it resembled its original self as well as any other thing so long buried.

The nineteen twenties were the heyday of the moonshiner and the bootlegger who ministered to the wants of the independent citizenry who refused to let a government take away their liquor. It mattered not that they didn't like the stuff, they drank the home made substitutes as if they were manna—and they were to the spirit. No damned government was going to take away their rights even if it took a stomach to prove it.

So along came Franklin Roosevelt who sensed that his city supporters would like some legal liquor and the reign of the bootlegger was over after a dozen years of the great experiment.

The lesson was not well learned for the nation immediately plunged into an experiment in economics more disastrous than the former experiment in morals and certainly one fraught with more danger to the human spirit than the first was to the human stomach.

REAPPORTIONMENT

We hoped to vote for the reapportionment measure on behalf of which petitions are to be distributed for signing within a few days. The first copy of the proposal has now reached our desk and we must say it is not reassuring. The procedures established under it are complicated and it is possible that Oregon could have a much larger number of representatives than it wants under this bill.

There are some good things. It gives one representative to Gilliam, Morrow and Sherman counties which are an economic unit that might share one representative with no great hardship. It puts this county in with Gilliam, Morrow, Wheeler, Jefferson and Crook in a senatorial district which is a fair division of area there being no large towns to take the senator at every election. It does set up some small representative districts like ours, Grant and Wheeler, Jefferson and Crook, Union and Walla and even Curry, that might never get a direct representative without some such arbitrary distribution.

But basically it is a legislative compromise designed apparently to retain the districts of present members. It establishes no principle. It is a population plan with certain specific exemptions that give smaller counties some advantage. However, this advantage is rendered practically useless by increasing the number of legislators. Eastern Oregon will have no more proportional power than before and as population grows it may well have less unless the growth is in eastern Oregon.

It is our present opinion that there is some value in the bill on a temporary basis and that this may be lost in a few years. This is but a stop-gap bill and deserves encouragement only because it will keep the apportionment problem before the voters. Eventually, we feel sure, they will decide that the United States, itself, has a method of apportionment better simpler, fairer than any wordy compromise that can be concocted.

PLEASE READ IT

This newspaper has now been informed by Postmaster Lloyd Johnson that box numbers will not be mandatory on all addresses on newspapers. This is a decision based on a ruling of the department that is equally as vague as the original. No bureaucrat admits error; they write another release.

We are thankful to the subscribers who wrote or called in their box numbers. It resulted in some fine visits with friends.

UNCOMMON NAMES

The annual basketball playoffs in the different classifications always bring to the light of publicity some names of towns so seldom heard as to be strange and thus romantic.

Over in Washington where the derivation of geographical names has not been so thoroughly catalogued as in Oregon where Tam MacArthur performed that service, this year the "B" contest will have St. John, Quilcene and Chumacum. Were these towns large enough to be frequently in the news everyone would be used to them, know their locations and their industry, but such is not the fate of "B" basketball towns. St. John should not sound strange to a population used to St. Louis or San Francisco and we presume the others are of Indian origin.

In Oregon there is Condon, named for Harvey Condon, a relative of the famed Thomas Condon, a minister of The Dalles who rode his circuit into the John Day valley and discovered the strange geology of that area and Fossil, which missed the tournament, was named for the fossils found. The school goes by the name of Wheeler, for the county.

There is Alsea for an Indian tribe and Walla for another, although the name may have come from Lewis & Clark and there is Mt. Vernon, an aristocratic sounding name in America. Corbett was named for a United States senator. Of the towns that lost there is Hereford, named appropriately for a beef bull and Weston, once home of a normal school where many early eastern Oregonians learned to teach.

A spectator could pick up a good bit of interesting geography and history between games if the committee would include such things on the programs.

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS" By C. WILSON HARDER

There is substantial evidence that the current session of Congress is tending toward becoming more hard-headed, and veering away from the Pollyanna fatuousness which has cost Americans billions.

It is being felt that dollars do not change human nature. The great apostle of non-aggression, non-violence, and "peace, brother, peace," C. W. Harder, namely, India's Nehru, did not hesitate to use modern arms to grab off a chunk of territory, even though Nehru has fed long and heartily at the trough provided by the American taxpayers.

His great cry was to end colonialism. Goa had been Portuguese since the 16th century, and of no great consequence to anyone. But lately, Portuguese capital had succeeded in developing an important iron mining industry in Goa, producing new wealth. India is not producing any new wealth. So bango, with 30,000 troops, planes, et al. Nehru "ends colonialism" and just by chance picks up a thriving new industry.

Robby movements never proceed under their true names. In early Nazi days Hitler spouted a lot of nonsense about "Aryanism." But back of it all was a move to rob a substantial part of the German nationals.

In the Indies, Sukarno, another recipient of huge amounts of foreign aid, has more territory than he knows how to develop. But the Dutch have

developed some economically important complexes in their possessions in the Indies.

Sukarno now wants to use force of arms to take over these Dutch properties under the banner of "anti-colonialism." Nobody, for example, raises the sacred cry of "colonialism" against Chinese control of Tibet, because there's no wealth in Tibet. Even that great bleeding heart of humanity, Nehru failed to lift one finger against the Chinese massacres in that lonely little nation on his border.

Long before World War II, General Douglas MacArthur warned "America is a vast storehouse of wealth which every nation in the world would plunder if they could."

Senator Barry Goldwater in a recent statement, put it another way, saying, "The trouble the U.S. finds itself in is failure of our policy makers to make proper use of American power. The affairs of nations—for good or evil—are determined by power. The Soviet Union has not gotten where it is today through the attractiveness of its doctrines."

The Senator further comments that the entire U.S. policy has been to butter up people around the world so that they think of Americans as just fine people.

He further states, "This sluggish sentimentality, this obsession for pleasing people, has become a matter of grand strategy. It is leading us, for all the good intentions it implies, to national and international disaster." Thus, realization seems to grow in Washington that Pollyanna principles are of little avail in a world run by gangsters.
