Speed Limit Again Proposed For Oregon

Oregon's Legislative Highway Interim committee will again be asked to recommend maximum speed limits for the state as a result of action taken Wednesday by the Oregon Traffic Safety commission.

Commission members also reaffirmed their support of amending the law to permit police to arrest or cite at accident scenes based on personal investigation and approved a new proposal to rule out rescinding a license suspension while a court conviction is being appealed.

The latter was recommended to the commission by a Portland Eastside Commercial Club's traffic safety committee.

Action on a proposal to re-examine all drivers whose licenses had been suspended before re-instating the license was postponed until the commission's next meeting when it was pointed out that to include financial responsibility suspensions in such a program would increase the workload of the Department of Motor Vehicles by about a third.

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Curtain Laundering Methods Told

If summer breezes have left curtains dingy, follow easy ways of laundering them suggested by Bernice Strawn, OSU extension specialist.

Sheer curtains of man-made fabrics—nylon or dacron polyester—collect dust but do not absorb soil readily. Before laundering, tumble curtains in a cool dryer to whisk away dust and soil, or shake outside.

Curtains are then ready to wash in warm water, advises the home economist. Wash five minutes with a generous amount of all-purpose detergent. If curtains are badly soiled, stop the washer after two minutes and allow a ten-minute soak before completing the cycle.

A fabric softener added to the final rinse will help eliminate static electricity and give a soft "hand" to curtains after they are dry, says Miss Strawn. Dry in dryer if available but don't overdry. Curtains should be removed from the dryer as soon as tumbling action stops. She says some curtains will need ironing; others only a touch-up with an iron.

Unlike the man-made fibers, cotton curtains absorb soil and require different laundering treatment. Use hot water and all-purpose detergent for white cotton curtains. For colored fabrics, choose a light-duty detergent and warm water. Agitate 10 minutes.

Glazed chintz curtains will retain their shiny surface longer if washed in cold water and light-duty liquid detergent.

Fiberglass curtains should not be machine washed, says the home management specialist. For convenience they may be placed in a tub or washer for a 10-15 minute soaking in warm water and all-purpose detergent. Don't spin, wring or agitate mechanically. If heavily soiled, drain water and repeat the soaking with clean water and detergent. Then rinse without mechanical agitation. Remove curtains from washer, shake out excess water and rehang. Fiberglass should not be put in the dryer.

Facings or special trim on curtains may require a little extra care in laundering, the specialist reminds.
