HOME TO ROOST

The chickens hatched from the legislative blunder of the decade are coming home to roost. There will be little new highway construction started in eastern Oregon this year and not much anywhere except to finish some jobs. Why? The legislature voted bonds for the utterly useless Astoria bridge, stole another bunch of money for a road from Roseburg to the coast and put the frosting on the cake with a final four million for some work across Tygh valley that would have been done shortly anyway.

Worst of all every state representative from eastern Oregon voted for the Astoria bridge bill except Annaia, McKinnis, Hansen and Sunz. Frank Weatherford, who was elected to represent this district added insult to injury by voting for the Tygh valley project.

So, we are now informed by the highway commission, that the \$810,000 project between Biggs and Wasco (Mud Hollow to Thornberry) will not be started this year and further there will be no projects in District 5 which will lose \$500,000 in contemplated work. When these jobs will start depends on further foolishness by the legislature.

Every little county, in fact, every county not big enough to have a sizable delegation in the legislature is helpless when road allocation is made by legislative log rolling. The bond bills passed last time and at the 1959 session were the start along that sort of road and no one who voted for any of them is deserving of the confidence of the voters because they have demonstrated political selfishness or ignorance of the principles of government.

Eastern Oregon cannot exist in such a political climate and the quicker we get mad enough to get out of it the better.

People's Column

Dear Editor:

I have a few questions, comments, and opinions to express on your editorial, "OF SCHOOLS," in the Friday, March 16, edition of the Sherman County Journal.

First I would like to ask: Have you ever attended an NEA-OEA Convention? Do you know for a fact that the NEA-OEA convention's purpose was the indoctrination of teachers by college professors? Do you know there is a difference between a professional organization and a union?

My comments will begin with an answer to the last question. There is a teacher's union (at least one in every state). It is the A.F. of T., the American Federation of Teachers. The NEA-OEA (National Education Association-Oregon Education Association) is NOT a union. It is a professional organization just as is the Oregon Newspaper Publishers Association of which I assume you are a member or the American Medical Association.

The purpose of the union is very different from that of the NEA-OEA. The union's A. F. of T. main objectives are higher wages and better working conditions for the teachers. It uses union tactics such as collective bargaining and strikes. (Last year the A. F. of T. in New York City went on strike and got their demands in a very short time.) It has no concern for professional ethics, standards or education. THIS IS NOT THE PURPOSE OF THE NEA-OEA.

The NEA-OEA's motto is "better education for a better world" and it evidences this by the high standards it sets for its members to attain its fundamental purpose for all American children. It is concerned with every facet of education from early childhood through adulthood.

I am not saying that NEA-OEA is not concerned with teacher salaries or welfare. They are. In order to get a better quality of people into the profession there has to be at least adequate salaries. But, here again the emphasis is on the betterment of education through better prepared and capable teachers, not just the betterment of the teacher as an individual.

In closing on this aspect of my letter I would like to express my opinion that the people should back this professional organization (NEA-OEA). If the union took control instead, then it would be not only a sad day for the tax payers' pocketbooks, but also for the education of their children as well.

As to the purpose of the NEA-OEA Convention, it certainly was not to indoctrinate teachers to acquire more training so there would be more attending the colleges. This is ridiculous from every standpoint. The teachers are not being indoctrinated by anyone but themselves. The convention is a meeting called by themselves as teachers, so they can share and exchange ideas for the advancement of education and a more professional teacher. The theme of the convention was, "Educational Leadership for Changing Times."

On the first question of whether or not you have ever attended an NEA-OEA Convention, I cannot venture an answer. I can add, however, that I base my facts and opinions on my own involvement with the NEA-OEA as a student, my attendance at the regional con-

ference at San Mateo this winter where the planning of the convention was discussed, on personal interviews with people—both educators and laymen—who attended the convention.

The purpose of this letter is not simply to expound an opposition to your opinion. It is to try to point out some facts to your readers who I feel were getting the wrong connotation of NEA-OEA, of its goals for education, and of education as a whole. And to them I say, "for heaven's sake stay with and behind your teachers and their professional organization for the reasons stated above. Support education for it is only through education that we can hope to find understanding, peace, and better living for this world."

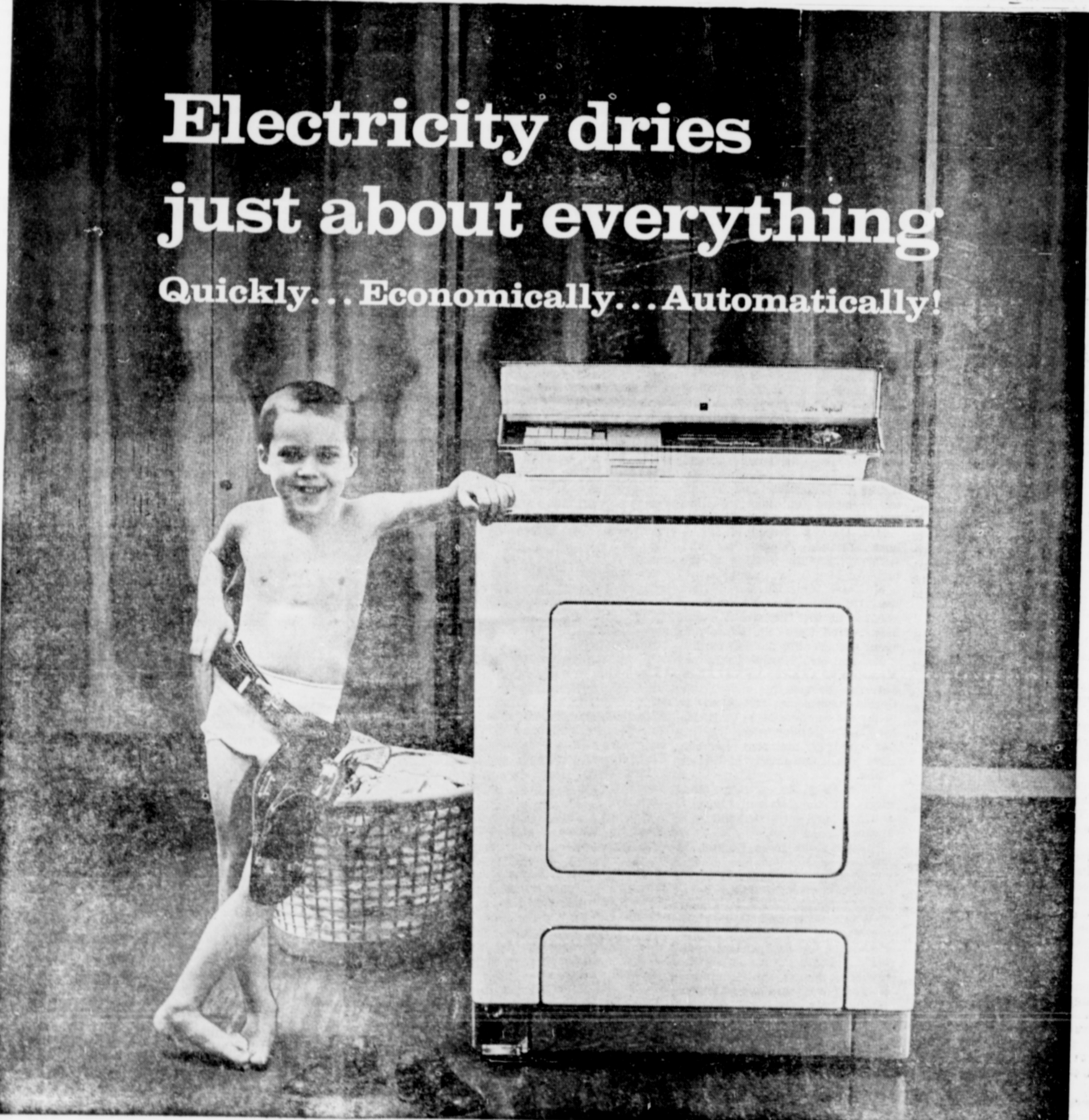

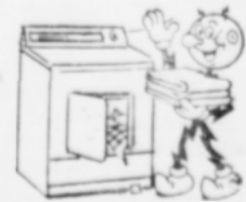
