It is an oddity that Frank von Barsel should carry the two southern precincts (where all the candidates lived) by 89 to 43 and lose in Moro 89 to 36. The closeness of the vote on the Moro city charter was a surprise and must be evidence of a fear of any kind of boat-rocking.

Many voters approved candidates who promised the most things and voted against appropriations to pay for them but that is common in elections. They are a sort of contest wherein contestants and partisans are aligned by a division no more philosophical than choosing up sides by lot and the surprising matter is the loyalty to party instead of the things the party stands for.

So good luck to losers who will never know the peculiarities of human psychology that denied them victory and a word to the winners who should remember that winning the job is not important—it is doing it well that counts.

THE ELECTION

For one who has been watching elections for something like a hundred years the one held last week looks like just one more of a series, but there are some peculiarities worth noting.

We are hopeful that some day a better way than elections will be devised to choose officers and determine the more difficult policies. In Portland where officials are picked because of name familiarity some of the results are fantastic. The use of television and radio aids the tendency toward electing the best looking and the best talking without regard to more useful qualities.

Voters who protest that candidates stand for nothing will look with awe at the fate of Walter Pearson who went about the state re-expressing his well known advocacy of a sales tax and a cabinet form of government, was sharply brought down by Bob Thornton who has not notably nor consistently adhered to anything. Future candidates may therefore dance to every tune.

Sig Unander was the best known and best qualified candidate for the Republican nomination for U. S. senator and won handily although local candidates did well locally as is right and proper. It will be November before we can know how far Morse's setting sun has dropped toward the horizon of oblivion.

We are pleased over the nomination of Jack Smith who promises some effective representation. We are not appalled that voters preferred to bear the ills they
