### Wheat League Stock Show All Set To Start

Wheat-fed cattle, hogs and sheep again will be exhibited at the annual Junior Livestock show of the Oregon Wheat Growers league at the Seufert buildings June 3-6 in The Dalles.

General Manager Elmer Lierman said a wheat league requirement for the 16th annual show calls for feeding of a grain ration not less than 20 per cent wheat by weight.

When the show was first held OWGL rules called for 50 per cent wheat, but a few years ago this was modified to permit the showing of animals fed on any grain ration, Lierman said.

A new feature of this year's show will be the showing of four commercially-fed fat steers in the Monday livestock judging contest.

Arrangements have been made by Larry Kasberg of near Wasco, chairman of the league's Youth Activity committee, to acquire the steers for showing and later slaughter in Portland with the carcasses to be returned here Wednesday by refrigerated truck for display at the show grounds.

Another feature of this year's show will be the two-day visit by a delegation of 22 4-H club members from Clatskanie to take part in livestock judging contests Monday and then observe operation of the show on Tuesday.

This year's show will be concluded Wednesday with auction sales during the afternoon and night. All show events will be on standard time.

### New Ag. Agent Coming

Albert Haslebacher, Klamath Falls, has been appointed area agricultural representative for the First National Bank of Oregon, it was announced by L. D. Price, manager of the Moro branch.

For the past two years Haslebacher has served as the bank's agricultural representative at Klamath Falls. He will make his headquarters in Pendleton.

Haslebacher has served as treasurer of the Klamath County Cattlemen's Association and secretary-treasurer of the Klamath County Young Farmers. He also has been a member of the Klamath County Farm Bureau, the Henley Farm Bureau and the Klamath Basin Sheep Producers Association.

He was employed from 1957 to 1959 by the agricultural extension service at Lakeview, with responsibility for the 4-H program in Lake County. A graduate of Oregon State University, he earned his degree in animal husbandry.

Youngsters must be currently enrolled in 4-H club work and 13 years of age by January 1, 1962, to participate. The cost of the school is \$25.00 per youngster.
