**RETAIL FOOD PRICES STILL STAY HIGH DESPITE PLENTY**

Retail food prices, pushed by increased marketing costs, rose slightly last year for the shopper, even though the farmer's share of the food dollar (38 cents) was smaller, reports Mrs. Elvera Horrell, OSU extension agricultural economist.

The small increase in the retail cost of the farm food market basket came while the farm value of these foods declined by one percent. However, marketing costs were up two percent over 1960, Mrs. Horrell noted.

Marketing costs are largely independent of the push and pull of supply and demand as experienced at the farm level, she points out. Payments for such items as labor, transportation, packaging and taxes are included in marketing costs.

Labor costs rose last year as hourly earnings of food marketing employees climbed four percent, but these employees also increased their output per man-hour which helped hold the lid on labor costs per unit of product marketed, she said.

On the other hand, for the third straight year, freight rates decrease moderately outweighed increases. Profits as a percentage of sales were also less, Mrs. Horrell pointed out. Nevertheless, she adds, the share of the retail dollar going to marketing agencies added up to 62 cents, one cent more than in 1960 and the highest share in more than 20 years except for 1959.

**County Ramblings**

Over 40 weed control trials have been established and are maintained in Sherman County. Morning Glory has been all but eradicated with annual treatments of three pounds of 2-4-D for three consecutive years on the Don and Bob King ranch, Moro.

Two pounds atrazine and two pounds amitrrole appears to be the best combination of chemicals for control of cheat grass and rye in fencerows, road sides and non crop areas. This fact was demonstrated on eight plots established in December 1960 through-out Sherman County. This combination of chemicals lasts for one year only. Retreatment with two pounds atrazine in January of 1962 has renewed excellent control of all annuals.

Other plots are for chemical fallow, jointgrass, Russian Knapweed, on the Leonard Fields ranch, purple mustard on the Hildred Zell ranch, cow cockle on the Bob Tatum ranch, seckle eye control on Chet Coats, Roland Johnson and Fred Dormaier ranches.

Several other plots are demonstrating current weed control practices.

**Quackgrass Control**

Quackgrass appearing in large fields can be controlled economically by cultivation. The spots should be plowed after harvest and left in the routh. Plowing exposes the roots to drying action. Several years of this tillage practice will be needed for complete eradication.

Several chemicals are effective for control and eradication of quackgrass. Apply atrazine to the soil in the fall at the rate of 20 pounds per acre.

Amitrole-T or dalapon may be used to control quackgrass. Apply 5-10 lbs. of dalapon or 4 lbs. of Amitrole-T per acre in 10 or more gallons of water, when green growth is present. CAUTION: These are all non-selective treatments.

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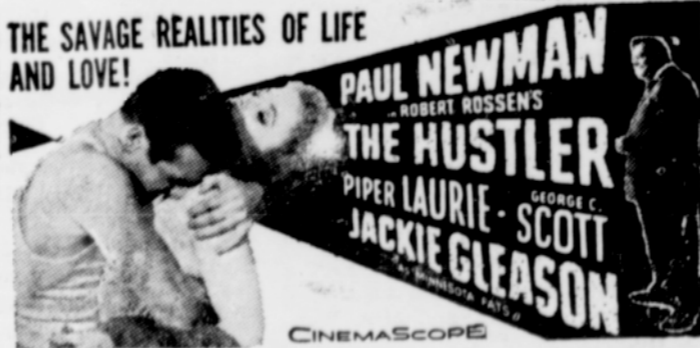
