by recommendations from county organizations and by those who appeared at the hearings. Fourteen county stock associations and 10 other farm organizations requested immediate repeal of the regulation. Six county stock associations recommended continuation in present form, with modifications.

BANKS MAKE REPORT

Bank deposits for the Upper Columbia River area including Gilliam, Hood River, Sherman, Wasco and Wheeler counties, increased in April, 1962, compared to April, 1961.
 Debits for April, 1962, totaled \$26,440,111. For March, 1962, the total was \$26,710,570, and for

April 1961, the total was \$21,229,838.
 Oregon with 239 banks reporting, had an increase in bank deposits in April, 1962, of 6.7 per cent compared with March, 1962, and an increase of 9.7 per cent compared to April, 1961.

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LAND PROMOTION

For years Oregon has been fairly safe from one type of promotion. Land promoters have worked Florida until no one would invest a dime there without complete examination, nor would he buy in California without careful consideration. It may soon be true of Oregon.
 A bunch of Californians have bought a large tract of land in what is called Christmas valley, east of Silver Lake but over a range of hills and in a different watershed — as if watersheds were of importance in a land so dry. A headquarters house has been built and a well drilled. Lots can be bought and promotion will certainly sell them at fabulous prices to unsuspecting suckers everywhere. It is called a retirement place and we suspect it will retire more dollars than people. The climate is cold and dry.
 South of Burns, a Chicago outfit has bought a wide expanse of level rabbit brush land and is selling it off in acre plots. It is useless, always was useless, always will be. Even as open range there is seldom any stock on it. If one drills deep enough at the right time of year he may find some brackish water.
 We presume that if an American owns land he may sell it and if an American has money he may buy land or whatever his gullibility dictates. We do think, however, that the birth rate of fools will have to increase if promotions such as these are successful selling ventures. It is not possible that they can be successful otherwise for all they have to offer is space, a little land.
 Counties will eventually have to foreclose on the lots and that will cost more than the taxes derived. The land is assessed at something like a dollar an acre; the taxes will be but a few cents unless assessors get smart suddenly and assess at the sale price. Even so it will be expensive for all but the promoters.

Brand Ruling Repealed By Board

The state department of agriculture announced Friday morning that it will repeal the controversial March 15 regulation on brand inspection of branded cattle upon change of ownership. The repeal will be effective on June 1.
 This action follows a series of three hearings, the last of which was held in Salem on Thursday afternoon before Assistant Director J. W. Southworth and the full State Livestock Advisory Committee of which Tom McElroy, Vale, is chairman.
