Care Urged By Governor Hatfield

Fourth of July drivers were urged today to observe all rules of the road during the next week's holiday.

The appeal was made by Governor Mark O. Hatfield, who said he hoped the state's traffic record for the holiday will be an improvement over that of last year when seven people were killed and 246 injured in 613 traffic accidents.

Although the Fourth falls in mid-week, officials expect hundreds of families to take to the open highway, many beginning their summer vacations.

He also suggested that families going out of town should tell someone else where they are going, what route they plan to take, and when they expect to return home. This simple precaution could save important time if the party fails to return and a search for them must be launched. Police patrols will operate at "full strength" during the holiday period.
