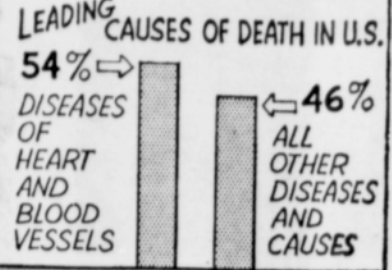

Rye Serious Menace To Wheat

Rye is certainly becoming a serious threat to our grain fields throughout Sherman county. The problem has existed for a number of years with concerted effort by some and little effort by others. Either we are more conscious of the problem now than previously or the problem is getting worse every year.

Some growers have made concerted effort to control rye by fencerow spraying, stubble disking, seeding of spring grain, cutting rye acreage for hay or, pasturing off, clipping and always the one two punch rouging. More effort needs to be extended by each method and other ideas as well.

Certainly one item that will pay both growers, cooperatives and the county is covering of grain trucks. This will reduce the spread of rye and other weeds blowing from the trucks at harvest time. Some folks have used canvas covers. Curly DeMoss this past year used lath in the front section of his bulk bed to deflect the wind and reduce the blowing of grain from the truck. This is a good bet and others should give it a try.

Rye contaminated grain means substantial discount in grades and price. The rye discount starts at two cents per bushel for a half percent rye. One percent is four cents and one and a half is six cents per bushel. This certainly gives a serious picture to the rye problem and the discount that can become apparent. Rouging and other items certainly pay in the attack upon rye.

USDA ANNOUNCEMENT

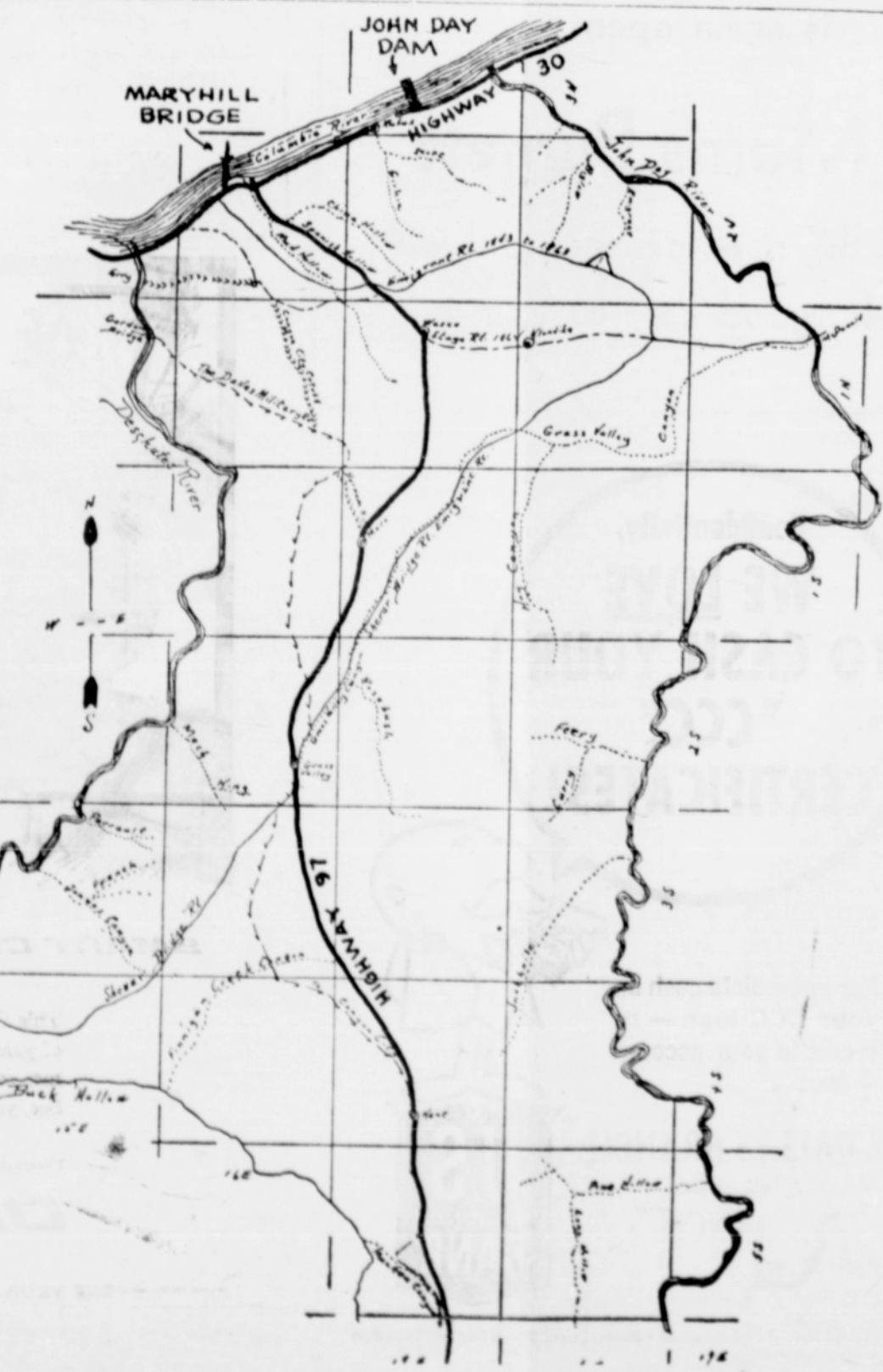
CCC NON-COMMITTED WHEAT INVENTORY
