U. S. National Has Gain For Quatrer

Continued substantial gains were reflected in deposits, loans and total resources of U. S. National Bank of Portland, according to figures released as of June 30, 1962.

Loans were up more than \$43 million and now total \$442,923,666 compared with \$399,863,658 recorded on June 30, 1961. Deposits increased in excess of \$54 million and now stand at \$881,010,767 compared with \$826,818,561 recorded the same date one year ago.

The Dalles Branch of U. S. National recorded total deposits of \$16,012,264.22, according to James L. Johnson, manager of The Dal-

les Branch. Loans and discounts for the branch totaled \$8,401,394.02. The Dalles Branch of U. S. National recorded total deposits of \$2,091,040.20, according to G. W. Hertel, manager of the Dufur Branch. Loans and discounts for the branch totaled \$653,840.56.

Total resources for the U. S. National system, with its 83 banking offices throughout the state, were \$975,187,163, up nearly \$56 million from \$919,266,780 recorded on June 30, 1961.
