Sherman Buys More Bonds

"Sales of Treasury Department Series E and H Savings Bonds in Sherman County for the month of July amounted to \$5739, it was announced today. The sales total for all of Oregon last month was \$2,702,306," the county chairman said. Last July sales were \$1542.

Since the first of the year, sales of small denomination bonds have increased throughout the Nation. During the first-quarter, for example, small denominations accounted for 57% of the National sales of \$1.2 billion. It is believed that at least part of this increase is attributable to the growing number of persons who use the Payroll Savings Plan for buying Savings Bonds at the plants where they work.

OLDS SELLS AT BEST EVER RATE IN 1962 SUMMER

Oldsmobile dealers delivered 45 per cent more new Oldsmobiles to their customers in the first 20 days of July than in the similar period a year ago, it was announced today by J. F. Wolfram, the division's general manager and a vice president of General Motors.

Many Fair Goers Visit Site of Round Butte Dam Near Madras

Oregon is capturing its share of World's Fair tourists, if the counting stations at the Round Butte damsite 10 miles west of here are any indication.

Over 35,000 visitors - many from out of state - have registered this summer at Portland General Electric company's new museum and observatory located on the rim of the spectacular Deschutes river gorge overlooking the \$60 million Round Butte hydroelectric project.

A construction force of 589 men is now working on the project, which includes a dam towering 450 feet high and generating nearly a billion kilowatt-hours of electricity annually.

The museum and observatory, constructed by PGE as a permanent feature of the project, includes a gallery, displays of artifacts, and wildlife native to the Central Oregon area and a large model of the dam, its reservoir and fish passage facilities.

Geologic specimens of the region are on display along with photographs of Central Oregon wildlife taken by Joe Van Wormer of Bend, a nationally known wildlife photographer.

Indian handwork and artifacts also are exhibited along with information on Billy Chinook, a Wasco scout for whom the Warm Springs Indians have named the reservoir which will be formed behind the dam.
