Bolger was a headline guest at ceremonies Sunday, August 12, dedicating the hospital's new \$2 million Children's Treatment Center. His compliment to Pat came during remarks to some 400 prominent guests, including U. S. Supreme Court Justice Byron R. White, attending the event.

"This is truly a haven, a haven of the open heart, Bolger said. "I've had a thrill. I visited the children, sat on the floor and played with them, and they displayed nothing but interest and joy—no fear, just a sincere happiness at having someone come to see them. This is rehabilitation in a great sense of the word."
