WHAT THEY TEACH
The curriculum at Sherman High School is much like the one used last year and undoubtedly much like that of other schools of the same size.

Marial Isolated Community With Scenery

The odd things began at Glendale, a small town devoted to retail distribution for a timber area whose old buildings have been mixed by the addition of a new school of the modern type. The road west ran up Cow Creek and after a few miles became a logging road, built by a logging company for the benefit of logging trucks which come down the steep and dusty grades in lowest gear with water streaming off screaming brakes.

The rule is that the trucks get the inside of the road and "Keep Right" or "Keep Left" signs notify strange drivers that their duty is to keep to the outside where they can peek down on top of 200 foot firs and hope the fill is solid.

The road follows the hogback, first on one side and then on the other until it has gone 25 miles. A sign informs that the road to Marial takes off to the left and it looks good as Bureau of Land Management men have widened and rocked the first four miles or to Bald Ridge, from where it drops from a 3626 elevation down to a little over 400 on the Rogue in eleven miles.

Above that on Tucker's flat, a patch of rocky earth a quarter of a mile long, the BLM has established a camp ground brand new with its tables still uncarved and its toilets still unwritten in, (park builders are unduly concerned with eating and elimination), complete with the inevitable fat man in a dirty undershirt vegetating on a park bench.

Professional guides take parties down the Rogue from Grants Pass to the ocean, usually taking five days of the customer's time and \$220 of his money for the service. They stop at pools and riffles for the steelhead fishing which is only good for ten weeks in the fall until the river rises in early November.

The passengers stop at Marial one night, staying at the lodge built there years ago and enlarged for benefit of that trade. There Marial, herself, Maggie, Marie and Manfred feed them sturdy meals and bed them down in comfortable rooms and encourage them to write their names and comments in a big guest book.

Marial is a Billings, the first family of the middle Rogue, first went into so rugged a country in the first place there are old timers to tell of early day gold mining when Mule creek was a center of that activity...

private plants and for evening use. If the BLM has ambitions to add the area it might dam Mule creek in one of its fifty foot gorges not over twenty feet wide and make ample electricity for the use of miners whose spirits would be stimulated by some power to work their claims. It could be brought across the hills and down the west fork of Mule Creek from the Eden ridge dam. Some logging is going on but it is an expensive place to log and big trees are growing in some places where man will never get them but with a helicopter.

It is recreation area. More money has gone into it than has been taken out and probably that will always be the case. But it provides soul stirring scenery. There are not many things that give pleasure and content like an evening on the balcony at Marial Lodge with the Rogue gently growling by, the little red deer feeding

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS" By C. WILSON HARDER

As this is written, it is not known what action Congress will perhaps have taken before publication of this column on the plan to withhold taxes on dividends and interest. In addition, the nationwide membership of the National Federation of Independent Business has not taken a vote on this issue.

But it seems quite significant that Sen. Harry Byrd has taken a stand against the proposal. It is possible, that some interest and dividends is escaping taxation. On the other hand, if there are cases existing where major tax sums are being avoided, it would be among people whose wealth and affluence would mark them; for intensive tax audits to begin with, and thus it would seem that any major malfeasance could be uncovered with ease by other methods.

But so far, no great publicity has been placed on the extremely heavy bookkeeping costs this would place on banks, savings and loan firms, corporations, and all others paying interest and dividends. Just to take one example that could eventually result: Millions of school children throughout the land are encouraged to open and maintain savings accounts, principally to teach habits of thrift.

Bear in mind that these savings accounts of the children do not represent huge sums transferred to them by rich and indulgent fathers, but are accounts built up by systematic savings from their allowances, money earned on paper routes, mowing lawns, et al. But if the savings banks every time they credit interest to the account of Johnny with a balance of \$18, or to Sue with a balance of \$48, have to compute the withholding tax and report it to the government, millions, if not billions of dollars worth of man hours will be expended.

And then if Johnny or Sue make demands for the refund they are entitled to get, it will take billions of dollars in bureaucratic salaries to get the refunds processed. Thus, the whole plan would seem to boil down to one of two alternatives: One is that this represents bureaucratic stupidity to the nth degree. The other is that it is recognized that many school children, retired people, pensioners, et al, with small investments, will not be able to, or will forget, to file for their refunds, and thus government will benefit by substantial collections of taxes to which it is not entitled. Of course, there may be another alternative which is tied up in a joke along the Potomac. It goes to the effect that the government is determined to be ahead of Russia in all ways, including government control of the private affairs of its citizens.
