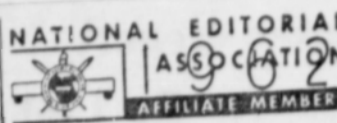

FAUPEURS BY CONSENT

We have been unable to find that any Sherman county was responsible for the inclusion of the county in the Area Redevelopment Administration scheme to force federal money into this prospering county.

The information about ARA available here indicates that it is purely a political organization formed originally to help distressed communities, but, because of the vague wording of the law, expanded to other places where the distribution of federal money may be helpful politically.

According to the regulations an area must have "persistent and serious" unemployment; and this area does not. Sherman county certainly does not and we will have to see the figures before we believe Wasco county has.

Neither county can qualify as to farm income and the law says that in rural counties farm income is to be the ruling factor.

No project would be helped by the federal management that would of necessity accompany federal funds. Meddling from Washington is fatal to any business and that would be especially true of a stock feeding enterprise.

Neither is it important that federal funds be used for such a project in this area; there is plenty of local money for it if and when local stockmen want to engage in such a business.

There are some other proposals, one being a grant to complete Sherman county's zoning and building specifications, certainly not a program worthy of a federal grant; to ask for research money to study cherry decline, handled better by Oregon State; study of port problems, loans to increase the size of the house trailer manufacture in The Dalles and loans to improve the moulding mill at The Dalles. These projects, if worthy, should be able to borrow money from commercial banks instead of from far away and uninformed Washington, D. C.

It all seems a very messy affair and one that has no chance to bring credit to anyone concerned. It is dishonest and immoral to take money under false pretences, unwise and tinged with bribery for the government to offer money to communities not in need and debasing to pride to be dependent.

THOUGHTS ON MISSISSIPPI

Governor Barnett could not be allowed to win. Everyone knew that and so did the governor. Whether his resistance was from principle or politics it had to be made if he were going to represent the Mississippi for that state doesn't want negroes in its university.

Whether James Meredith attends University of Mississippi or not makes little difference for he will undoubtedly be flunked out in a few months and after that he can drop back into the oblivion from whence he came as did that Texas matron who pled for admission to the University of Alabama. The Kennedys would force the state to agree to admission of Meredith in some easier way than did the Eisenhower administration and because of typical irresolution wound up in a more difficult situation with troops as well as U. S. marshals in hand and at least two deaths. If there are many withdrawals of whites, university education in Mississippi may be damaged for several years. All of which is rather unnecessary.

We are obsessed with the theory of universality; that everyone must conform; that all laws must be obeyed to the letter. We fail to see that the fate of the nation hinges on whether Meredith or any other negro goes to the University of Mississippi. There are hundreds of universities that admit negroes and there are colleges for negroes. Isn't it reasonable to permit a university to be for whites only if it desires?

We do not subscribe to the theory that negroes must mingle with whites when and where they are unwelcome. We do not think it is beneficial to either race to force such a conflict. For negroes, if they are to become important people and hold important jobs, are going to have to do it as negroes for that is what they are.

The south has been wrong in keeping the negro uneducated and without earning capacity so that so large a part of the population cannot consume the products of the country. But we know of no reason why they have to be integrated with whites if whites don't like it. In fact, it is not the color as much as the social standing, the moral customs, that makes the negro unwelcome in white society.

Furthermore the negro problem is in politics. Meredith was forced into the University of Mississippi in order to retain the vote of northern negroes, not for any interest in the shy little black man who is being pushed into a spot where he does not belong. There isn't much sincerity or much honesty about the whole business.

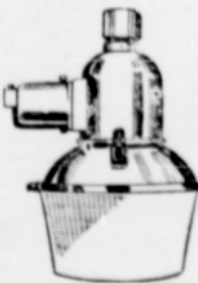
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
