BOB CHANDLER

Bob Chandler is a man, a man in the American mold. If he is elected to congress he will represent the second district of Oregon and do it in his own way without too much regard for the politics involved.

Bob Chandler is a man because he cherishes the independence of his American heritage. He does not want to barter for beans, however plentiful or easily obtained. Second district voters should be proud to have such a man on their ballot.

Chandler calls attention to the subservient history of his opponent, Al Ulman, who has merely been another Democratic vote, following Sam Rayburn or John McCormack and representing them rather than the second district. It would be cheaper to send a blank proxy back to Washington.

Those who respect their American heritage will be thrilled by Chandler's statement of principles in which he says that he does not choose to be a common man, seeks opportunity, not security, refuses to trade his opportunity for a dole and is not afraid of threats to make him subservient.

We would like to see Bob Chandler in congress and feel sure that if that body contained a majority of his kind the nation's downward path would soon be reversed and the nation again become the spiritual leader of the world instead of the most material.

Furthermore we often hear criticism of the public that it refuses to accept the planning of these potential do gooders. Well, there is nothing sacred about plans or planning that puts them above criticism. One of the things planners must learn is that if their plans do not meet the test of popularity or are unsuccessful they must accept the responsibility therefore. In other words there is nothing divine about being a planner.

We think there should be some qualifications for planners. While we don't mind anyone standing on a street corner and telling how this and that should be done or doing the same with louder oratory around a bar, we do think that any planning to be taken seriously should be done by someone who has attained some official status. Elected officials should have the right to make plans for the public, but we think there is a limit to their power to appoint planners; at least to have them accepted as bonafide public planners. The public can get rid of elected planners, not the appointed ones.

The nation, and the state, is full of committees and commissions with busy typewriters and insistent voices planning, planning, planning. There is a tremendous cost to all this and without attendant public good.

Satisfied citizens may engender some of this activity. They refuse to take an interest in schemes of inept planners so the planners form a committee and go out on their own. It is this kind of planning the public should learn to diagnose and defeat.

BOONDOGGING

Senator Morse's office announces that the Area Redevelopment Administration has approved the \$8,500 "technical assistance contract for an economic study to determine the feasibility of establishing a livestock feed lot and meat processing center in Wasco and Sherman counties in Oregon."

The study will be done by Oregon State University and a branch of the USDA, and will take six months.

Just recently OSU took over a research project on the same thing in Umatilla county, a facility provided by private persons. Umatilla county is not so far from Wasco county that a new project is needed. Stock feeding in Umatilla county has been slowed down because of the government's unfair practices on feed grain prices and when government gets out of the way will go ahead.

The work of demonstrating that cattle, hogs and sheep can be fed on the grains and hay produced in Umatilla county was done through the activity of the Pendleton Grain Growers without benefit of political boondoggling. The results of that are available to Wasco county. That means that the \$8,500 will be wasted.

What is worst about it is that it was meant to be wasted. The purpose behind the \$900,000,000 appropriation for economic development was to buy votes. No proper investigation has been made of the Wasco county scheme since the application for it was announced; no proper investigation was made before this area, including most prosperous Sherman county, was declared in need of federal aid.

Somebody had to lie to get it started. The information is already available, so the need for it is fictitious.

That is where so much tax money goes; that is why federal taxes are so high; that is why no one interested in sound government can support so political an administration; that is an example pure waste; that is an example of governmental dishonesty done, we are sorry to say, with the connivance of irresponsible local citizens of this area.

We hope the responsible citizens of Sherman county will insist on the removal of this county from such disgraceful company.

U. S. Nat'l Bank Still Increasing Size

An all-time high in total deposits at a call, plus continued substantial gains in loans and total resources of U. S. National Bank of Portland, were reflected in figures released to the comptroller of currency as of Sept. 28, 1962.

Loans were up more than \$68 million and now total \$481,962,937 compared with \$413,643,148 recorded Sept. 27, 1961. Deposits increased in excess of \$17,978,363 and now stand at \$936,951,992 compared with \$861,019,494 recorded one year ago. The Dalles branch of U. S. National recorded total deposits of \$7,534,509.02. Loans and discounts for the local branch totaled \$546,271.45.

Total resources for the U. S. National system, with its 85 banking offices throughout the state topped \$1 billion amounting to \$1,033,686,308 up nearly \$77 million from \$956,748,412 recorded on Sept. 27, 1961.

PRESIDENT'S TOUR

We would like to live long enough to learn what history will say of President Kennedy's political tours on behalf of Democratic candidates. We suspect they may be put in the same category as Nero's fiddling while Rome burned.

The Russians are moving into Cuba. South America is paying the United States less and less attention, even while spending our money. The United Nations is becoming an African pressure agency. Europe is breaking away from NATO. Laos is developing into a major war, the nation's economy is slowly disintegrating, the gold supply is dwindling, and the president spends four days a week talking politics.

He is telling his audiences that more Democrats should be elected which wouldn't be such a bad idea if they were the same kind of Democrats who worked so diligently to defeat his rather immature and expensive program at the session just ending. Kennedy lays his defeats to the Republicans when, in truth, that party hasn't enough congressmen to defeat anything without substantial Democratic help.

The president's trouble is that the program he proposed was so lacking in economic soundness that it could not be forced thru a congress of his own party.

It was Passman who defeated the big foreign aid appropriation; it was Kerr who defeated medicare; it was Byrd who defeated the worst parts of the tax bill. Not one is a Republican.

The emphasis on politics of this administration is giving attentive citizens cause for worry and the waste of public money to implement its political moves is causing the economy to go downhill. Sound thinking and less public spending is needed and we think the people sense it.

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS" BY C. WILSON HARDER

There seems to be great confusion as to whether or not, officially the United States is anti-communist. It is perhaps easy to understand this confusion as for two decades many in government, especially in the State Dept. have labored hard to spread confusion.

A recent example of confusion spreading was the action taken regarding Peru. A new government, the U. S. State Dept. was about to come in power in that nation. A group that had at one time been considered quite communist, but now, according to State Dept. views, merely "liberal." The conservative Peruvian army leaders were apparently not so sure on this score, so a military junta took over.

In 24 hours, the U. S. State Dept. cancelled that portion of the world wide give away funds that had been earmarked for Peru. Apparently the cry of the day was "millions for the left, but not one cent for the right."

Of course, a few days earlier this selfsame State Dept. had been most active on the Hill arguing that Congress should in no wise limit the authority of the department to give money away to Communist Tito, who has already gotten \$2 billion.

These maneuvers confuse the public. But even Congressman Glenn Cunningham is confused. He is one of the proponents of a bill introduced last January to stop the flow of Russian propaganda into the U. S. from being handled postage free. The nation's independent business, voting through the National Federation of Independent Business, have overwhelmingly voiced support of this measure.

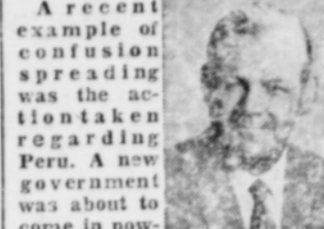
Under international postal usage, nations are supposed to carry in their mails the newspapers, publications, pamphlets of other nations free. Several years this privilege was stopped for Russian material, then restored in past 18 months as State Dept. did not want to hurt Kremlin feelings.

Rep. Cunningham says a Customs Bureau official reports that in a single year, through only three ports, Russian propaganda has reached as high as 20 million pieces.

A great deal of it, he says, is known as "refection material" being directed to people in America whose heritage is in countries now behind the Iron Curtain, urging them to come back to glorious communism.

But the Congressman finds by his fight on this issue he is not influencing people and winning friends in the Red circles. He reports, "It has been most enlightening to me to see how the left supports the free flow of communist propaganda into this country and a continued subsidy by the taxpayers for such material. I have always been interested in the attacks they launch on me personally."

It appears if communism is to be fought in this country, it will be the duty of Congress to wage such a fight, as from evidence at hand it appears the State Dept. is either heavily staffed with some very colossal idiots, or dedicated leftists.
