Burns Too Tough For Sherman Gridders 30-6

The Burns Highlanders sought revenge and found it against Sherman as they swept over the Huskies 30-6 in league competition on the Highlander's home field, October 19. Last season the Huskies were host to Burns and beat them 27 to 21. Ten of the Burns squad that traveled to Sherman last year played again this year.

The fired-up Burns team gained possession of the ball early in the first quarter when they recovered a Sherman fumble. The Highlanders burst into a scoring spree in which they scored four touchdowns in the five times they had possession of the ball in the first half.

Sherman's only score came in the third quarter after a drive from the Huskies' 33-yard line. Doug Bish, Bill Doolin, Mike Lane and Bob Parker rolled up first downs in the drive with Terry Decker and Virgil Fields making key gains. Bish scored the touchdown on a 1-yard quarterback sneak. Doolin's PAT attempt failed. Burns made the last touchdown in the final quarter raising the score to 30-6.

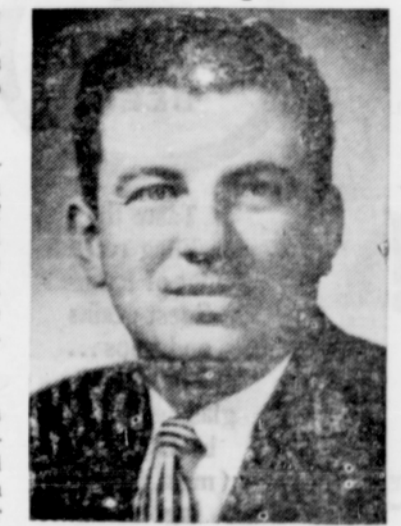
Doolin suffered from an injury received previously and made only brief appearances in the game. Jack Kellogg re-injured his knee in the final period. Roger Cyphers also came out in the fourth quarter with a rib injury which will keep him out for the rest of the season.

Sherman has two games left in the season: Condon and Heppner. Victories in these games could still give the Huskies a winning season. Heppner will be ready to repay the 19-0 defeat Sherman gave them last season. Both Condon and Heppner have beaten Grant Union this season, and will probably be planning to beat Sherman.

Local Women Attend Meeting of Cancer Fund Raisers; Hear News of County Win

Mrs. Hildred Zell, director of district 6, Mrs. Frank von Borstel Sherman county chairman and Mrs. Eben Kee, Grass Valley area chairman were delegates at the annual meeting of the American Cancer Society held in the Village Green motor hotel near Cottage Grove Thursday and Friday.

On Thursday, education, annual crusade for funds and service were stressed with James M. Whitely MD, state service chairman presiding over the latter meeting. (If dressings, beds, etc., are needed by cancer patients in the county, a volunteer worker or Mrs. Eben Kee, Grass Valley, county service chairman, may be contacted for detailed information.) A. C. Hutchinson MD, of Portland spoke at the evening dinner meeting on "Moscow as I Saw It." He had attended an international cancer meeting held recently in Moscow, Russia.

Friday morning there was an interesting panel of doctors, moderated by Mrs. Ann Sullivan, staff

writer of the Oregonian. Harvey W. Baker MD, of Portland said that lung cancer is closely associated with cigarette smoking, the majority of lung cancer patients have smoked cigarettes over a period of years and that it is rare to find lung cancer in a non-smoker.

Clifford Allen MD of Portland, stressed that radiotherapy is now being used to good advantage in treating some forms of cancer and that the equipment, although very expensive, is far stronger and better than that formerly used. It is sometimes used to shrink tumors before removal by surgery. Only about half of the applications for grants for research work can be granted at present. One doctor was presented who had received a \$300,000 grant for use to buy equipment for his project in research.

Sherman county won the award for the highest per capita donation to the cancer fund in 1962 with 58.2 cents per person.

Wheat League Readies Program For County Meet

The Oregon Wheat Growers league, Sherman county branch, will meet at the court house next Tuesday at 9:30 in the morning for a day of discussion about their problems.

The six committees will be led by Charles Burnett, Taxation and Legislation; Ted Thompson, Marketing and Transportation; John Shipley, Production and Land Use; Larry Kaseberg, Youth Activities; Mac Hall, Public Relations; Owen Eakin, Federal Agricultural Programs; Mrs. Althea Burnett, Domestic Wheat Utilization.

These committees will meet in different rooms of the court house until four o'clock by which time they will be expected to have formulated resolutions which will be presented at the state meeting in Portland November 26-28.

At noon they will go to the church for a free lunch prepared by their wives and friends.

At two o'clock Winn Tuttle, administrator of the wheat commission will explain the 1964 wheat program and Paul Kaseberg will speak on re-apportionment, the bill on the ballot. Committees will report and officers will be elected for next year. Hildred Zell is president of the Sherman county branch.

There will be much discussion of the position wheat growers should take in relation to the still somewhat nebulous farm program for 1964. Taxation and legislation will discuss many old problems that have never been resolved to suit them. The Youth committee will consider having a show champion instead of one for both 4-H and FFA and the possibility of a carcass show.

The public relations committee will consider the recent visits of newsmen to farms in Morrow county and its possibilities. New barley varieties and the restriction on use of 2,4-D will be subjects for the Production and Land Use committee and Marketing and Transportation will again consider barge subsidies, new grain standards, pricing on hundred-weight basis instead of bushels and the distorted feed grain problem.
