Constitutional Amendments & Measures Submitted to Voters of State at Large

Referred to the People by the Legislative Assembly

REORGANIZE STATE MILITIA—Purpose: To amend Constitution by authorizing legislature to reorganize state militia. Eliminates election of certain officers. Empowers Governor and Adjutant General to appoint all officers. YES ☐ NO ☐

FOREST REHABILITATION DEBT LIMIT AMENDMENT—Purpose: Amends forest rehabilitation constitutional debt limit from 3% of 1% assessed valuation to 3-16 of 1% true cash value of all taxable property in state. YES ☐ NO ☐

PERMANENT ROAD DEBT LIMIT AMENDMENT—Purpose: Amends constitutional debt limit for permanent road purposes from 4% assessed valuation to 1% true cash value of all taxable property in state. YES ☐ NO ☐

POWER DEVELOPMENT DEBT LIMIT AMENDMENT—Purpose: Amends constitutional debt limit for power development purposes from 6% assessed valuation to 1 1/2% true cash value of all taxable property in state. YES ☐ NO ☐

STATE COURTS: CREATION AND JURISDICTION—Purpose: To amend Constitution by authorizing legislature to pass special laws as well as general laws creating lower state courts and defining and regulating their jurisdiction. YES ☐ NO ☐
