FALL GRAIN SPRAYING

Early fall rains brought up weeds right along with the grain. Some fields we have noted, may need fall spraying to control tarweed. One-half pound of 2,4-D ester seems to be the best chemical and rate based on research in the Columbia Basin. (Do not go over three-fourth pound. Spring spraying is the best, but many fields won't wait that long. For best results, do not spray during cold weather.)

CARYNE ON RYE

We plan to spray several plots with Caryne again this year to attempt selective control of rye in wheat or barley. We are looking for several sites of 4 or 5 acres each where rye is emerging with the wheat or barley. The rye should be in the 2 or 3 leaf stage and grain no bigger than four leaves.
