A really big rain hit the county Monday night, the water coming down all night to leave every bit of outdoors soaked by morning when it quit. We didn't need it but accepted it.

**SEAT BELTS HELD GREAT SAVERS OF LIFE IF USED**  
Had seat belts been in universal use, Oregon's 10-month traffic death toll might be well below 300 instead of nearly 400.

The Department of Motor Vehicles reported today that 114 of the state's traffic victims during this period were thrown from their vehicles at the time of impact. National studies indicate it is five times safer to remain inside a vehicle and in your seat at the time of a crash.

Although it is doubtful that seat belts would have saved all these lives—some crashes are classified as non-survivable—the department said the safety device undoubtedly would have saved a great many.

Vern L. Hill, director of the department, urged Oregon car owners to have seat belts installed at the earliest opportunity and to use them all the time.

Seat belts, he said, can be most valuable in reducing injury severity in urban accidents. Yet, surveys indicate many people still use them only on out-of-town trips.

With the state now in one of the most dangerous times of the year from the standpoint of total accidents, Hill suggested the first gift on the family Christmas list should be seat belts and, he added, "this is one gift which definitely should be opened before Christmas."

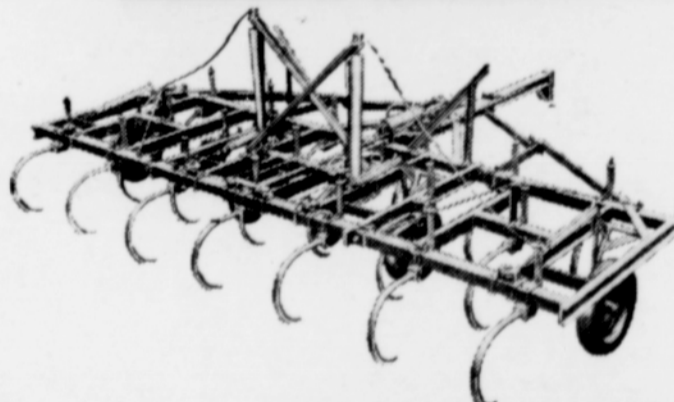
