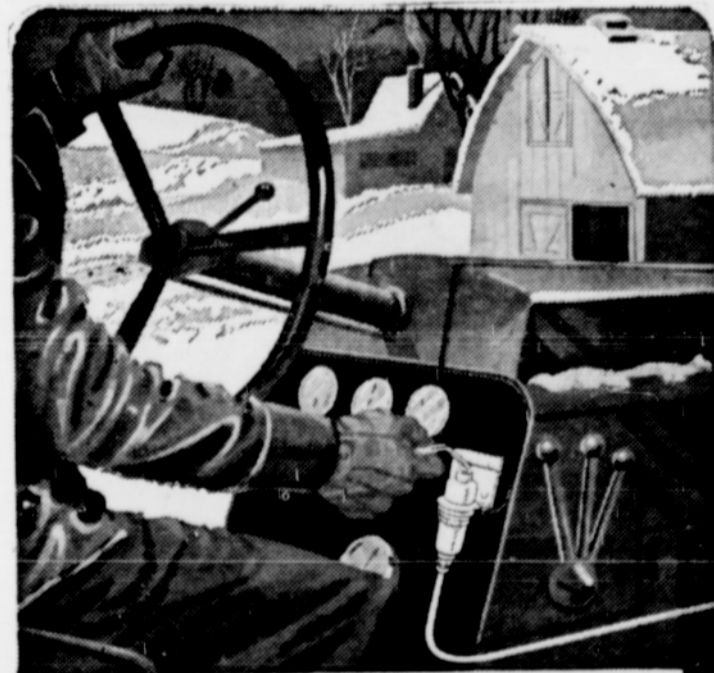

WORK EASIER

Just remember — "Life is hard by the yard, by the inch it's a cinch." Don't try to swallow the whole yard the last few days — start now, but bite off a few inches each day. A written plan will help.

What causes yellowing and tiny black spots on white pillowcases? This is usually due to a combination, hair oils and creams. Rub the yellow areas gently with a soft brush and full strength liquid detergent or hair shampoo. Follow with regular hot water wash and bleach occasionally. Be sure to use enough detergent.

Black specks are tiny drops of oil that settle on fabrics and collect dirt if wash water is not hot enough or if water softener is needed.

Lint in the washer plagues many homemakers. Make sure not to wash linty fabrics along with dark clothes. Turn clothes inside out to keep lint from sticking to the outside. Rinse out the tub after washing such things as flannel, sweaters, terry towel or diaper.

Maybe you're skimping on detergent. Detergent helps keep suspended lint so it can't settle on clothes. If adding more causes a flood of suds, then try a low sudsing product. And if you use the wash water over again, add a little more detergent for the second load of clothes.

To prevent spilling when you pour liquid from a bowl, touch the handle of a knife (in vertical position) to the bowl rim. Pour down the knife and liquid will run in a steady stream.
